I would like to discuss a couple of upcoming opportunities for our students and community members.

For our students, we are in the process of organizing our Summer School Program. We have already committed to offer swimming lessons with the YMCA in Port Edwards. New for the 2009 Summer School Program will be transportation to and from Bancroft. We will be picking up students at a central location and returning them at the completion of summer school classes each day. In addition to the transportation, we will be offering a free breakfast and lunch to any student in our district. If you have questions, please feel free to give me a call.

If you remember, the Board of Education set goals for this school year. One of our goals was to solicit public input regarding our schools and district. We believe that our schools and district belong to the public and one the best ways to gather information is simply by asking your input. The Board's goal reads:

Goal: To establish a survey that will be sent to community members and recent graduates soliciting their opinions regarding the operation of the district and suggestions that will enhance our district.

System of Measurement: Include survey results in annual meeting mailing and provide information at annual meeting in September.

Starting in May, we will be offering two surveys asking for your input, the Community Survey and the Alumni Opinion Survey.

The Community Survey will be asking your input on several areas. Those areas include climate of the school, cleanliness/safety, instruction, and communication/follow-up. We will be asking your opinion regarding several curricular areas, should you have students in school, please feel free to ask their assistance. Lastly, we will be asking your opinion as to the greatest challenges facing our schools, what you consider the best feature/attribute of our school, and anything that you would like to see changed.

The Alumni Opinion Survey will be asking input from our 2007 graduates. The survey will be asking questions regarding their careers, co-curricular activities, curricular information, and any classes/changes they would recommend for our high school. If you were a parent of a 2007 graduate, we would ask that you let your child know about the survey and ask them to participate by taking the survey. We appreciate your helping us in gathering the data.

In our May newsletter we will explain how you will be able to take part in the survey. We look forward to hearing from you and serving the needs of our students.


High School Student of the Week March 9 - 13, 2009

Several of the Technology Education classes have been working on numerous other projects for Almond-Bancroft community members, from minor home repairs, cabinets and shelves, to small engine work.




DID YOU HEAR? A-B FORENSICS STUDENTS ARE GOING TO STATE!

Wonderful Quilts Brighten Up the ELMC

The Elementary LMC has two new beautiful quilts adorning its walls. **Betty Burns** (grandmother to **Alex & Andy Burns**, sons of **Richard and Heather Burns**, and **Grant & Daniel Burns**, the sons of **Edward and Leslie Burns**) was the primary artist behind these projects. Her daughtersin-law Leslie and Heather as well as Leslie's mother **Kathy Richtmyre** all worked together on these fabulous quilts.

The first quilt has a sturdy brown tree with brightly colored cloth leaves made from the traced hand-prints of students from the Class of 2019; *this year the students are in second grade.* Each leaf has a student's name, and there are also leaves for the three Kindergarten teachers (**Mrs. Thompson, Mrs. Gardner, & Mrs. Pinter**) who taught these students in 2006-2007. The quilt was made in the spring of 2007, and it belongs to Grant Burns and his parents. They are generously loaning the quilt to the LMC for display. The tree, a symbol of growth and knowledge, is set

against a blue sky background, and it has a framed geometric border of yellow, brown, red, and purple.

The second quilt, also on loan from the Burns families, is titled "The Be Attitudes." It is decorated with twelve distinct squares which cleverly illustrate these important goals which we should all strive to attain: Be Warm, Be Loving, Be Positive, Be Kind, Be Patient, Be Respectful, Be Honest, Be Peaceful, Be Smart, Be Forgiving, Be Grateful, and Be Joyful.

A-B School to Receive \$12,298.86 in E-Rate Funds

Each year public schools across the country apply for E-Rate funds. The E-Rate (The Schools and Libraries Universal Service Support Mechanism) provides discounts and reimbursements, funded by the federal government, to assist schools in their quest to obtain affordable Telecommunications and Internet Access. The Universal Service Program is administered by the Schools and Libraries Division (SLD) of the Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC). This corporation was appointed by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to ensure that the benefits of telecommunications services reach as many students and communities as possible - especially small and rural schools such as ours. To be eligible, each school must have a Technology Plan in place, meet the requirements of the Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA) as directed by the FCC, and spend part of their local budget on necessary technology such as the Internet, email services, web hosting, computer hardware, instructional software, and phone services.

Then the school must annually appoint a person or entity to fill out a series of complex online forms and gather the necessary information for the federal paperwork in order to apply for reimbursements and discounts on behalf of the school. The time frame of 7-01-2008 through 6-30-2009 was the last application I filed after working on the district's E-rate for over half a dozen years, and I am pleased to announce that the Almond-Bancroft School District will receive \$12,298.86 this year in discounts and reimbursements for Telecommunication and Internet bills. The E-Rate filing process is now in the capable hands of Jenny Miner and Karin Finken of CESA 9, and the school district should continue to receive these valuable technology funds in the years to come.

Supporting the Troops

This is an ongoing program - not just for the holidays. Also, our thanks to the **Almond American Legion Auxiliary** for their monetary gift which was used for postage and supplies sent to our troops in combat zones. Note: The cost of shipping each box is \$11.95 to the APO addresses.

ASSIGNMENT OF STUDENTS TO CLASSES

Parents who wish to request a specific teacher for their child who will enter grades kindergarten through fifth during the 2009-2010 school year must do so no later than May 1, 2009. This deadline was developed to give the teachers and principal sufficient time to assign students to classes prior to the end of the school year. At the completion of this process, your child's teacher for the 2009-2010 school year will be indicated on your child's fourth quarter report card. The Board policy regarding the assignment of students to classes includes the following: "Students may be assigned to other classrooms upon parent written request provided that: a) Space permits, b). reasons are appropriate, c). the request is received on or before May 1st of the previous school year." Requests must include an appropriate reason for desiring a particular class or teacher. Reasons for request that are vague may be returned for further clarification. Request forms are available in the office.

Just because a request is submitted doesn't mean that the student will automatically be placed in the requested classroom.





National Honor Society Membership Candidacy

To be eligible for membership consideration, students must have a cumulative grade point average of a 3.2. Additionally, potential members must meet high standards of leadership, service, and character. Members of the sophomore class will be evaluated by a Faculty Council.

Leadership is based on a student's role as a participant in school and community activities, and election to offices. The service requirement is met by those actions taken by the student on the behalf of others, without personal compensation. Also reviewed is the student's attitude toward any service project. Character is measured in terms of integrity, behavior, ethics, and cooperation with both students and faculty.

Students will be screened by a Faculty Council consisting of five members of the faculty members.

Family, Career, and Community Leaders of America By Renee Hunkins






