april 2012 A-BFFA Received Donation



The Almond-Bancroft FFA/Agriculture Department received the America's Farmers Grow Communities-Monsanto Fund, on behalf of the BJ Turzinski, Ben Turzinski Farms. BJ Turzinski farms. BJ Turzinski applied for the donation of \$2500 from the Monsanto Corporation. The

Are your cell phone calls to the A-B School District not always connecting correctly?

We have been aware of this issue for quite some time, but it is beyond our direct control. As more of you are calling the school via your cell phone rather than a "land line", more of you are now experiencing the issue as well. We would like to take this opportunity to "shed some light" on the issue.

This problem is a national issue known as the "National Call Termination Issue", which the FCC is still working on resolving. Some carriers are using "least cost routing" which sometimes sends a call down a lesser quality circuit. If a call is "damaged" before it makes it to its last "local phone service" provider (Union Telephone Company in our case), they cannot "fix it" before the call is sent on to its final destination (our school in this instance) potentially causing the call to not be handled or completed as desired.

We have known this issue to occur most frequently when calling the school via a cell phone, due to the calls translation from "wireless" to "land line" over several circuits and networks. However, the issue can also occur with any non-Union Telephone customer calling a Union Telephone customer, as the call is originating from outside the Union Telephone network. Any call from a non-Union Telephone network customer to any Union Telephone network customer has the possibility of being "broken" before it arrives at its destination, possibly causing the call to not be handled or completed as desired, due to this NCT issue.


PBIS

National Honor Society Membership Candidacy



To be eligible for membership consideration, students must have a cumulative grade point average of a 3.2 and meet high standards of leadership, service, and character. Members of the sophomore class will be evaluated by a Faculty Council consisting of five members.

Leadership is based on a student's role as a participant in school and community activities, and election to offices. The service requirement is met by those actions taken by the student on behalf of others, without personal compensation. Also reviewed is the student's attitude toward any service project. Character is measured in terms of integrity, behavior, ethics, and cooperation with both students and faculty.

ASSIGNMENT OF STUDENTS TO CLASSES

Parents who wish to request a specific teacher for their child who will enter grades kindergarten through fifth during the 2012-2013 school year must do so no later than May 1, 2012. This deadline was developed to give the teachers and principal sufficient time to assign students to classes prior to the end of the school year. At the completion of this process, your child's teacher for the 2012-2013 school year will be indicated on your child's fourth quarter report card. The Board policy regarding the assignment of students to classes includes the following: "Students may be assigned to other classrooms upon parent written request provided that: a) Space permits, b). reasons are appropriate, c). the request is received on or before May 1st of the previous school year." Requests must include an appropriate reason for desiring a particular class or teacher. Reasons for request that are vague may be returned for further clarification. Request forms are available in the office. Just because a request is submitted does not mean that the student will automatically be placed in the requested classroom.


