Notes from the Administrator.....

I would like to thank the folks who attended the listening session that was held on Thursday, November 13th. We discussed future course offerings, current programs, the possibility of having the *Boys & Girls Club of Portage County* offer a program in our district, and many more topics. It's been over a year since I became your district administrator. In that time I have been impressed with the members of the Board of Education. You may ask, "What are the roles and responsibilities of the members of the Board of Education?" According to the Wisconsin School Board Association, "the first requirement is that [a school board member] must be an advocate for children. A member of the school board is entrusted with one of the most important responsibilities that can be assigned to any citizen - that of helping to direct the education of the youth of his or her district. In no other country is there local responsibility for and authority in education comparable to the American school board. This local responsibility and authority - local control - varies in degree from state to state, but it assures that local public schools are flexible and responsive to community needs. In Wisconsin, over 2,800 school board members are making decisions, which affect over 800,000 children enrolled in the public schools of the 426 school districts in the state. These board members, as individuals, generally have no more power or authority than any other citizen in the district. It is when the individuals are meeting as a board that they can make decisions affecting the district. Major responsibilities include: Student achievement, policy-making, evaluation, board-administrator relations, budget responsibility, public relations, and political relations." In my years of education, I have had the unique experience of working with over 30 school board members and thoroughly enjoy working with our board at Almond-Bancroft. The next time you see a board member, thank him or her for doing an outstanding job in a very difficult position.

As we approach the busy holiday season, may we all keep focused on the truly important things in life and be thankful for the many freedoms and blessings that we all enjoy! Please take the opportunity to attend our scheduled Holiday Concerts. The students and staff are working diligently to provide you with entertainment for the season.



Almond-Bancroft Students Learn Taxidermy

Two Almond-Bancroft students, Ken Smith and Brandon Warzynski, were recently taught the art of taxidermy through their Wildlife Management course. Auburndale school teaches this semester-long course through our distance-learning lab. Using a basic taxidermy kit and instructional video, Ken and Brandon learned how to skin, stuff, and mount their squirrels. This is the first time our students were taught taxidermy, and everyone was very impressed with their work!!

<u>Almond-Bancroft Middle School Students Study</u> <u>Forestry at the School Forest</u>

On Monday, October 20 and Wednesday, October 22, 7th and 8th grade students from the Almond-Bancroft Middle School life science classes studied forestry skills as part of a unit on Wisconsin Trees and Forests at the Carrie Frost School Forest site with Portage County DNR Foresters Kent Glazer and Matt Schoonover.

The students learned about measuring distances and counting paces with Mr. Schoonover to determine a "chain", a term foresters use to measure an area within a stand of trees. They also used their pacing and compass-reading skills to execute a challenging compass course through the forest with Mr. Schoonover's guidance.

Students worked with Mr. Glazer to identify a plot of trees and see how foresters use specialized instruments to take measurements within the plot. They practiced using the instruments to take measurements of tree diameter and height, and did some "timber cruising" with cruising sticks used to measure the number of trees within a plot which have reached harvestable size. They also looked at aerial photos of the site, and compared an area which was recently thinned to an area of an earlier thinning to observe changes that have occurred since the harvest was done.

Students spent some time learning about the history of the property, its multiple uses, and they also gained information about careers in forestry. It was a great day to be in the woods, and the students thoroughly enjoyed the presentations. We appreciate the time that our county foresters took to be with us in the school forest.

So far this year we have been focusing on honesty in our G.I.F.T.S. lessons. We will be moving on to a new concept soon, but you can reinforce honesty at home in many ways:

- Give your children a second chance to tell the truth.
- Praise truthfulness heartily, and treat dishonesty calmly and matter-of factly. Children are more likely to be honest when they know their parent will not fly off the handle.
- Some families find that this policy encourages honesty: break a rule, receive a consequence, lie about it and receive another consequence.
- Help children to understand that lying *may* work in the short-term (avoiding punishment) but it has long-term effects such as unfair blame on someone else, guilt/remorse and damage to friendships and other relationships.
- Family game night is a great time to encourage honesty/playing by the rules. Cheating may help to win the game, but may make a child an undesirable playmate.
- Don't ask children to lie for you ("tell him I'm not home").
- Set a good example and point out when you chose honesty over dishonesty.
- Teach honesty with politeness. It is admirable to tell the truth but not to hurt someone's feelings ("that's an ugly shirt").

Fifth-Grade Students Get Involved in the Presidential Election

Recently, fifth-grade students studied the presidential candidates and informed fellow elementary students about the candidates with classroom presentations. Students read about the candidates and where they stood on issues such as the economy, education, Iraq, the environment, and health care in a recent issue of their classroom magazine, <u>Scholastic News</u>. Students used the information to help them decide which candidate to support and worked in groups to prepare posters and PowerPoint presentations for classroom presentations. Officer Annette Pulchinski worked with the fifth-graders for five class periods, teaching them about influences, consequences, positive activities, and the Counter-ACT skills of checking-out the situation, offering consequences for illegal and unsafe behaviors, suggesting positive alternative activities, and leaving the scene. Students completed activities with their parents to encourage the discussion of drugs, alcohol, and violence at home. Elementary students, teachers, parents, and administrators attended the graduation.



Secondary Counselor News From the Desk of Ms. Spencer

To Parents of College-Bound Students:

College is right around the corner for our seniors and so are the college bills. Almond-Bancroft students have been invited to attend Tri-County High School's Financial Aid Night to help parents and students navigate the Free Application For Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) process. This application needs to be submitted for consideration for federal student grants, work-study, and loans.

Tri-County High School is holding their Financial Aid Night on Thursday, January 8, 2009 starting at 7:00 p.m. Financial Aid Supervisor Mary Jo Green from Mid-State Technical College will be presenting information on the FAFSA and answering questions afterwards. Please come to this presentation to learn more about the financial aid process.

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Q: What is Selective Service? A: The Selective Service is a government

The Selective Service is a government agency whose job is to provide untrained manpower for the Armed Forces if there's a national emergency.

Q: What is Selective Service Registration?

A: By registering, you add your name to a list of all the men in the nation, ages 18 through 25. The list would be used to identify men for possible military service in case of a national emergency.

Q: What happens if there's a draft?

A: There hasn't been a draft since 1973. If there were an emergency sufficient for Congress to order another draft, Selective Service would conduct a birthdate lottery to decide the order in which to call men. Those who turn 20 during that calendar year would be called first in a sequence determined by the lottery. If more men were needed, those 21 to 25 would be called, youngest first.

Q: Who is required to register?

A: The law says that all 18-year-old men (including U.S. citizens living abroad and non-citizen immigrant males 18-25 residing in the U.S.) must register. The only young men exempt from registration are non-citizen males who are in the U.S. temporarily as tourists, diplomats and their family members or foreign exchange students; incarcerated or institutionalized men; men on active duty in the Armed Forces; and students at U.S. military academies.

Q: Why don't women have to register? A: Our nation only registers men. This has always been the case. Selective Service law as it is presently written refers specifically to "male persons" in stating who must register and who could be subject to a draft. Therefore, Selective Service procedures do not apply to women. In order for women to be required to

Q: What if I don't register? **A:** You are breaking the law. If n

You are breaking the law. If prosecuted, you could be sent to prison for up to 5 years and may be fined up to \$250,000. In addition, if you fail to register, you cannot qualify for federal student grants or loans for college, job training benefits and many state and federal jobs.

Q: Is registration hard?

No. In fact it's never been easier. A young man can register with Selective Service in less than 2 minutes via the Internet at: **www.sss.gov**. You can also register by going to your local post office and completing a registration form. It's as simple as filling in your name, address, telephone number, date of birth and Social Security number. Registration forms should be available in your local recreation or social service center, school's guidance or registrar office, or you may receive a form in the mail. Simply complete it and mail the form to Selective Service.

Q: When should I register? A: Within 30 days of your 18th b

Within 30 days of your 18th birthday. If you cannot register on time because you are hospitalized or in prison, you have 30 days in which to register after you are released. If 30 days have already passed since your 18th birthday, **register** immediately, either **online** or at your post office. Although Selective Service will accept a late registration, the longer you wait, the longer you are breaking the law and jeopardizing your future benefits.

Q: How do I prove I registered? **A:** When registering via the Internet v

When registering via the Internet, you will receive your Selective Service number immediately. That number is your proof of registration - for safe keeping, jot it down. You will receive a Selective Service card by mail within 2 weeks confirming that number. (Note: If you registered by mail, you will receive a card confirming your registration with 60-90 days.) If you don't get your card within 90 days, write to:

Honoring Native Americans

In honor of National American Indian & Alaska Native Heritage Month, both the Elementary LMC and the Secondary LMC had window displays of Native American posters and books.

The Elementary LMC also had a fantastic display of three-dimensional models of Native American homes. **Mrs. Weiss**' fifth grade social studies students worked very hard this year to make realistic recreations of many different types of Native American houses - everything from Earth Lodges to Hogans to Plank Houses. They used a variety of materials including twigs, pretzels, sand, play dough, cardboard, pine branches, birch bark, and stones. These homes show the diversity of Native peoples all across the United States.

Also, hanging from the ceiling of the Elementary LMC are carrying pouches (parfleche) inspired by the Plains Indians and made by the **fifth grad**ers in the art classes taught by **Mrs. Ritter**. The students used raffia, colored beads, and brown paper bags decorated by crayons and markers in symmetrical and geometrical designs. They rubbed the waxy crayon marks with paper towels to make them shiny, and the brown bags are wrinkled just enough to simulate the textured leather of bison. The students did an incredible job capturing the beauty of this traditional Native American craft!

NEA President Dennis Van Roekel issued the following statement to urge adults and students to commemorate November as a month to learn more about the rich history and heritage of American Indians and Alaska Natives:

"Education can open minds, create appreciation and dissolve stereotypes. We should all take time to remember the contributions of the first people who called America home. Native Americans helped shape this land. We must make a commitment to honor, respect and preserve their rich history, languages and customs."

Voting Results from the Mock Election

The United States presidential election of 2008 was historic in many ways. With no incumbent President or Vice President, both parties ran extensive primaries. The Democrats nominated Senator Barack Obama and the Republicans Senator John McCain. Senator Obama won the presidential election thereby becoming the first African American president of the United States. He is now the president-elect and will be inaugurated on January 20, 2009.

The Almond-Bancroft Mock Election yielded results similar to the Wisconsin state vote and the national statistics. In Wisconsin Obama received approximately 1,670,474 votes, McCain received approximately 1,258,181 votes, and other candidates received 35,453 votes.

In Almond-Bancroft School Election held on Oct. 29th, Barack Obama was the winner with 276 votes. John McCain received 115 votes, and other candidates received 28 votes.

Mike Gerlach and I want to thank all the students and staff for participating in this ground-breaking election, **Ed Warzynski** for delivering the polling booths, the **freshman Civics students** for working at the LMC Polling Station, the **LMC Science students** and **Mrs. Van Ert** for putting up bulletin boards and information about the candidates, and the **Village of Almond** for loaning the booths to the schools.

The election was a great success - no long lines at the polls, no hanging chads, no registration disputes. All students, from the first graders through the seniors in high school, as well as staff members, had the opportunity to vote - if they desired to exercise their civic duty. Many children and adults were dressed in patriotic red, white, and blue for Election Day. Since it was also Red Ribbon Week organized by **Dawn Barber** (Elementary Guidance Counselor), elementary students also wore ribbons stating, "I elect to be drug free." This event tied in perfectly with the student mock election which proved to be a very worthwhile experience for the students and a lesson in democracy first-hand.

INTERNET PREDATORS IN WISCONSIN 22,304 Unique IP Addresses Identified In Wisconsin As Downloading Child Pornography

MADISON – This year marks the 10th anniversary of the founding of the Wisconsin Department of Justice Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force. "While great success has been achieved in this area of law enforcement, there is much work that still needs to be done," said Wisconsin Attorney General J.B. Van Hollen.

The following map represents all IP addresses seen in Wisconsin from January 1, 2008 to October 19, 2008 that were identified as download candidates for images known, or suspected to be, that of child pornography. Each red square on the map represents at least one IP address seen at least one time. A single dot, however, can represent multiple IP addresses due to overlap.

During this time frame there were 22,304 unique IP addresses that were identified as attempting to download child pornography. This is believed to be a conservative estimate that only shows the minimum size of the problem. For example, the map does not include IP addresses that were identified but could not be mapped. It is possible that some IP addresses may come back to the same offender.

"In the past decade, Wisconsin's ICAC Task Force and Affiliate Agencies have arrested 540 suspects, executed 647 search warrants, and rescued countless numbers of children throughout the state," said Van Hollen.

Van Hollen has placed a priority on law enforcement's proactive response to the growing problem of internet crimes against children. To that end, Van Hollen has directed a 67% increase in the number of special agents assigned to the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force within the Division of Criminal Investigation. Van Hollen's 2009-11 budget request for the Department of Justice includes a request for additional special agents and criminal analysts to protect our children from sex predators who utilize the Internet to prey on children.

In addition to expanding investigative capacity internally, Van Hollen and the Department of Justice have continued to add additional local affiliates to the Wisconsin ICAC Task Force. The number of local law enforcement partners to the Department of Justice's ICAC Task Force has more than doubled to 62 in the past year.
