2012 School Report Cards Available To The Public

The 2012 Wisconsin Department of Instruction School Report Cards are now available to the public. Within this edition of the Almond-Bancroft School Newsletter, you will find copies of the elementary report card, and the secondary report card (middle and high school combined).

The report cards are broken down into four primary areas:

The first is **student achievement**, which focuses on math and reading. The scores you see are derived from equations that are based on weighted averages from student performance on the Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Exam (WKCE). The scores you see in the report are based on student performance on the WKCE during the Fall of 2011, last school year.

The second area is **student growth**, which focuses on the number of students that grew in their knowledge of math and reading. Again, the scores you see are derived from equations that are based on weighted averages from student WKCE scores.

The third area is **closing gaps**, which looks at how particular student groups such as, students with disabilities, social economic status, English language learners, etc, performed on the WKCE. These various student groups WKCE performance is looked at and compared with each other. The difference between the groups scores is considered the "gap."

The fourth area is **on track and post-secondary readiness**. It focuses on graduation rates, attendance rates, third grade reading scores, eighth grade math scores, and ACT participation and performance. The individual school scores are compared to the state average.

You will see in the following school report cards that the elementary school did very well, with a combined score that placed the elementary school in the "**exceeds expectations**" category. The middle and high school combined report cards shows that we are in the "**meeting expectations**" category. Though the District is very pleased to be meeting and exceeding expectations, it is our goal to continuously improve from year to year. These report cards are being used to help us define our strengths and weaknesses so that we can more precisely plan how to improve the overall education for all our students.

At this time the District is primarily concentrating on the secondary school, since that is the area with the most need for improvement. We are working with the staff, particularly the math and reading staff, to align our curriculum to the Common CORE State Standards that have been recently adopted. Generally this is leading to increased rigor in the classrooms. The curriculum specialist will be working with the reading and math staff with a focus on assessment in the classroom, and how we need to adjust our assessment practices to better meet the learning needs of our students. Another area we are looking at to help improve student performance is in the use of our school day. The District will be looking at methods to maximize our schedule to provide students with the necessary reading and math instruction while still providing a wide array of elective courses for students to participate in, including the addition of Advanced Placement courses.





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
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Middle School Students Of The Month





ASVAB: Not Just for the Military

The ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery) is the test a person must take to enter into the US Military. The ASVAB Career Exploration Program is a civilian-based program that can help students take steps toward finding a career that's right for them. Students do not need to be interested in the military to take the ASVAB. They can benefit from the Program whether they plan to pursue further education after high school or enter the workforce right away. The first step towards finding a career is to spend some time finding out about yourself. The ASVAB Career Exploration Program includes tests and activities that help students identify their interests and provide information about their Verbal Skills, Math Skills, and Science and Technical Skills. It lets them know how their interests and skills relate to the demands of more than 400 occupations to help students start making educational and career plans.

The ASVAB is being given this year on Tuesday, December 4 at 8:10 am. All Sophomores, Juniors, and Seniors will be encouraged to sign up for this free career exploration tool closer to the testing date.



<u>Q:</u> What is Selective Service? Δ.

The Selective Service is a government agency whose job is to provide untrained manpower for the Armed Forces if there's a national emergency.

Q: What is Selective Service Registration? Δ: By registering, you add your name to a list of all the men in the nation, ages 18 through 25. The list would

be used to identify men for possible military service in case of a national emergency.

What happens if there's a draft? Q:

There hasn't been a draft since 1973. If there were an emergency sufficient for Congress to order another draft, Selective Service would conduct a birthdate lottery to decide the order in which to call men. Those who turn 20 during that calendar year would be called first in a sequence determined by the lottery. If more men were needed, those 21 to 25 would be called, youngest first.

Who is required to register? Q:

Δ. The law says that all 18-year-old men (including U.S. citizens living abroad and non-citizen immigrant males 18-25 residing in the U.S.) must register. The only young men exempt from registration are non-citizen males who are in the U.S. temporarily as tourists, diplomats and their family members or foreign exchange students; incarcerated or institutionalized men; men on active duty in the Armed Forces; and students at U.S. military academies.

Q: Why don't women have to register?

A: Our nation only registers men. This has always been the case. Selective Service law as it is presently written refers specifically to "male persons" in stating who must register and who could be subject to a draft. Therefore, Selective Service procedures do not apply to women. In order for women to be required to register with Selective Service, Congress would have to change the wording of the law.

What if I don't register? Q:

You are breaking the law. If prosecuted, you could be sent to prison for up to 5 years and may be fined up to \$250,000. In addition, if you fail to register, you cannot qualify for federal student grants or loans for college, job training benefits and many state and federal jobs.

Q: Is registration hard? Δ.

No. In fact it's never been easier. A young man can register with Selective Service in less than 2 minutes via the Internet at: www.sss.gov. You can also register by going to your local post office and completing a registration form. It's as simple as filling in your name, address, telephone number, date of birth and Social Security number. Registration forms should be available in your local recreation or social service center, school's guidance or registrar office, or you may receive a form in the mail. Simply complete it and mail the form to Selective Service.

O: When should I register? A:

Within 30 days of your 18th birthday. If you cannot register on time because you are hospitalized or in prison, you have 30 days in which to register after you are released. If 30 days have already passed since your 18th birthday, register immediately, either online or at your post office. Although Selective Service will accept a late registration, the longer you wait, the longer you are breaking the law and jeopardizing your future benefits.

Q: How do I prove I registered?

Δ:

When registering via the Internet, you will receive your Selective Service number immediately. That number is your proof of registration - for safe keeping, jot it down. You will receive a Selective Service card by mail within 2 weeks confirming that number. (Note: If you registered by mail, you will receive a card confirming your registration with 60-90 days.) If you don't get your card within 90 days, write to:





10 tips for setting good examples

You are the most important influence on your child. You can do many things to help your children develop healthy eating habits for life. Offering a variety of foods helps children get the nutrients they need from every food group. They will also be more likely to try new foods and to like more foods. When children develop a taste for many types of foods, it's easier to plan family meals. Cook together, eat together, talk together, and make mealtime a family time!

Nutrition Education Series

Eat vegetables, fruits, and whole grains with meals or as snacks. Let your child see that you like to munch on raw vegetables.

go food shopping together

Grocery shopping can teach your child about food and nutrition. Discuss where vegetables, fruits, grains, dairy, and protein foods come from. Let your children make healthy choices.

get creative in the kitchen

Cut food into fun and easy shapes with cookie cutters. Name a food your child helps make. Serve "Janie's Salad" or "Jackie's Sweet Potatoes" for dinner. Encourage your child to invent new snacks. Make your own trail mixes from dry whole-grain, low-sugar cereal and dried fruit.

offer the same foods for everyone Stop being a "short-order cook" by

making different dishes to please children. It's easier to plan family meals when everyone eats the same foods.



reward with attention, not food

Show your love with hugs and kisses. Comfort with hugs and talks. Choose not to offer sweets as rewards. It lets your child think sweets or dessert foods are better than other foods. When meals are not eaten, kids do not need "extras"—such as candy or cookies—as replacement foods.

focus on each other at the table

Talk about fun and happy things at mealtime. Turn off the television. Take phone calls later. Try to make eating meals a stress-free time.



Tisten to your child

If your child says he or she is hungry, offer a small, healthy snack—even if it is not a scheduled time to eat. Offer choices. Ask "Which would you like for dinner: broccoli or cauliflower?" instead of "Do you want broccoli for dinner?"

Iimit screen time

Allow no more than 2 hours a day of screen time like TV and computer games. Get up and move during commercials to get some physical activity.

encourage physical activity

Make physical activity fun for the whole family. Involve your children in the planning. Walk, run, and play with your child—instead of sitting on the sidelines. Set an example by being physically active and using safety gear, like bike helmets.



be a good food role model Try new foods yourself. Describe its taste, texture, and smell. Offer one new food at a time. Serve something your child likes along with the new food. Offer new foods at the beginning of a meal, when your child is very hungry. Avoid lecturing or forcing your child to eat.
