

In The Event Of A Two Hour School Delay

In the case of bad road conditions or extremely cold weather Almond-Bancroft Schools may opt to put in place a two hour school delay. A two hour delay will push back the time your student will be picked up by the bus by exactly two hours. So if your child(ren) are normally picked up by the bus at 7:30 am, in the case of a two hour delay they would then be picked up by the bus at 9:30 am.

The school day will start exactly two hours later than normal.


High School Student of the Week January 5 - 9, 2009

News From Lisa Vann, Spanish/ELL Teacher

What makes a good role model for our students in today is not necessarily what someone might have said in the past, but is equally important. Students in Spanish classes had to complete a research project about Positive and Negative Role Models from Latin American Countries and their influences on Latin American Teens.

Here are their compiled comments that might make you think about what people see when they look at you as being a possible mentor for their lives.

- Make good and appropriate decisions.
- Show a serious want of helping adolescents.
- Understand the way adolescents behave and think nowadays.
- Understand that adolescents might not always take your advice.
- Tell some of the situations you have been in and the choices you made in those situations.
- Try to connect with the adolescent you are mentoring.
- Show that you care about the adolescent and the choices they make.
- Tell about the things you can accomplish in life if you apply yourself.
- Get to really know the adolescent you mentor and challenges they face in their lives.
- Earn the trust of those you mentor.
- Since 1909 we have much more technology and laws protecting children and teenagers. Back then it was common for teenagers to work in factories to help earn money for their families. Now it's illegal for them to work that hard and nearly every child in the USA goes to school. As a result today's teenagers are more educated but they also don't have as much responsibility.
- With the power to influence comes great responsibility to do, say, speak, and act in a way that would not negatively affect a person who might look up to them so they don't get a bad impression of the person they admire or copycat.
- Volunteer in your community and support the young people's events. If you can't afford to support them in any other way, just show up to their event and let them know you care with a smile.
- If you're trying to fake being a mentor just don't bother because you will be found out and then that person will not trust the next mentor who might have helped that person out of trouble.
- Respect your bosses and those around you or we won't respect ours which is you.
- Have good manners to those that are bigger and smaller than you.
- Do not do drugs or brag that you got drunk.
- Kids have ways today of being more up to date on everything.
- Be a Big Brother or Sister and help someone who can't help himself/herself. Plan activities thinking about the little and not just yourself.
- Work hard to be good at sports because steroids are just a waste and in time affect your entire life's work in a negative way.
- Even if you can only help a little know that it can make a HUGE difference to a kid who could eventually make a HUGE difference in the world you live in.
- If you come off like a mean person on the first impression you can be written off as someone who can help in a moment. Do positive things all the time and earn their respect.
- As a mentor you can just be yourself, most people will like you for who you are; you don't have to change for anyone.
- A role model is "someone worth imitating." "Every kid needs a good role model." What are you worth?
- Share your past experiences so I can learn from them and not by repeating them and learning the hard way.
- Don't come home drunk after driving yourself home and then expect me to make good choices.
- Mentoring requires dedication toward another human being, kind of like a marriage could be, supporting another person for the better
- Mentors need to understand everyone has their own learning levels, rates, and capabilities. Mentoring in my opinion would be very hard! But worth it!

The Department of Public Instruction provides the following guidelines for parents who wish to apply for open enrollment.

Parents are urged to apply on-line directly from the open enrollment website http://dpi.wi.gov/sms/psctoc.html. The on-line application will be available from midnight Feb. 2 until 4 p.m. on Feb. 20. Applications cannot be made at any other time.

Paper applications can be obtained from the DPI or any public school district. Paper application forms must be submitted to the nonresident school district no earlier than Feb. 2 and no later than 4 p.m. on Feb. 20. A postmark for paper forms will not meet the requirement. Hand-delivery of paper application forms to the nonresident school district is strongly recommended.

Parents may submit applications to no more than three nonresident school districts for each child during the open enrollment application period. Submitting more than three applications to nonresident school districts will result in all applications being invalidated.

Forms must be filled out completely and accurately. Contact the local school district office or the DPI if assistance is needed in filling out the form. An inaccurate or incomplete form may result in denial of an application.

Parents may request enrollment in a specific school or program in the nonresident school district; however, enrollment in the requested school or program is subject to space and other limitations and is not guaranteed.

Most students who attended a nonresident school district under open enrollment last year are not required to reapply for the 2009-10 school year. However, if the student will be entering middle school, junior high school, or high school in the 2009-10 school year, parents should call the nonresident school district to find out if reapplication will be required.

Parents may apply for their children to attend 4-year-old kindergarten under open enrollment only if the resident school district also offers a 4-year-old kindergarten program for which the child is eligible.

To assist parents in submitting open enrollment applications, a directory of public school districts is available on the DPI website at http://www.dpi.wi.gov/schlsrch3.aspx. Dainty Daffodils - \$15 (live plant)


Gift of Hope - \$25 (larger bouquet in a vase)

<u>Preschool Screening – Child Development Day</u>

The Almond-Bancroft School District will be holding preschool screening (Child Development Day) on Tuesday, March 10 between 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. at the Bancroft school. Parents in the district who have children between the ages of 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 4 that are currently not enrolled in a school provided program are requested to attend. If you're worried about the way your baby or toddler is developing, the Birth to Three Program will also be on hand to screen children from 3 months of age through 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ years. Appointments are needed for all screenings and should be scheduled by Feb. 26th.

Children will enjoy a number of fun activities designed to compare their play, socialization, motor skills, and overall developmental levels with other same-age children. Hearing and Vision screenings conducted by Portage County Health Dept. are included as part of the preschool screening. In addition, representatives and/or literature from various community services (Birth to Three, Family Resource Center, Head Start, etc.) will be available to provide information regarding services offered to families with young children.

Parents of children born *prior* to June 1, 2006 should contact Sandy Barden at Almond-Bancroft Schools to schedule an appointment between 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. (366-2941 ext. 329). Parents of children born *after* June 1, 2006 should contact Sue Chapman at Birth to Three Services to schedule an appointment between 9:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. (342-0393). The entire screening will take approximately 1 to 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours. Children under the age of 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ can be screened in approximately 45 minutes.

Note: The school district must locate, identify and evaluate ALL resident children with disabilities (including children with disabilities who attend private schools, regardless of the severity of the disability). The school district uses a special education screening program to locate and screen all children with suspected disabilities who are resident of the district and who have not graduated high school, to determine whether a special education referral is appropriate. Four-Year Old Kindergarten Registration

Four-year old kindergarten (4K) registration will coincide with the Preschool Screening on Tuesday, March 10th at the Bancroft school from 8:45 until 3:00. To register for 4K, children must be 4 years of age on or before Sept. 1, 2009. Three year olds who are determined to have special needs will also qualify for enrollment in the integrated 4K / Early Childhood program. Please bring your child's birth certificate to verify his/her age. You will also need emergency contact information, immunization records and your family doctor and dentist's phone numbers. Registration can be completed in about 20 minutes. No appointment is necessary. Please contact Sandy Barden at 366-2941 ext. 329 with any questions you may have.
