





Winter Book Displays

There are some important holidays and celebrations in January and February, and both the Elementary LMC and the Secondary LMC have special displays of books and corresponding student handouts with word searches, fun facts, crossword puzzles, and pages to color. After all, according to Simon Jones, a Library is "a boundless buffet waiting to feed your hungry mind." There are so many fascinating topics upon which you can feast.

Martin Luther King Day was January 18, and the whole month of February is designated Black History Month. It's important for our small rural community to explore historical issues and race relations in America. As Martin Luther King, Jr. said: "I have a dream that one day this nation will rise up and live out the true meaning of its creed, 'We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal." Some of the books on display are: *Happy Birthday*, *Martin Luther King; The Civil Rights Movement in America; King Remembered; Extraordinary Black Americans; Black Women Leaders of the Civil Rights Movement; From Slavery to Freedom; My Brother Martin - A Sister Remembers Growing up With the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and African Americans - A Portrait with a foreword by Maya Angelou.*

This year the **Chinese New Year** falls on February 14, 2010. It will be the start of The Year of the Tiger. Although everyone always thinks of lion dances and firecrackers, there is so much more to this special holiday: spending time with family, historical traditions, gift giving, and, of course, the festival of wonderful food. Some of the books on display are: The People of China and Their Food; Count Your Way Through China; Happy New Year! Kung-Hsi Fa-ts' Ai!; The Ancient Chinese, and Shen of the Sea - Chinese Stories for Children.

Of course **Valentine's Day** also falls on February 14. There are books on friendship, love, romance, cooperation, and families including such titles as Valentine Treats - Recipes and Crafts for the Whole Family, The Valentine's Day Grump, Bus 9 to Paradise - a Loving Voyage by Leo Buscaglia, the classic story of Cyrano de Bergerac, Guess How Much I love You, Jane Eyre, Romeo & Juliet, and Mama, Do You Love Me?

And Feb. 15 is **Presidents' Day**. The LMC has books on all the presidents from Washington to Obama. The newest title is An American Journey of Barack Obama, which is published by Time-Life and is a collection of photographs and essays that chronicle the life of President Barack Obama, discussing his childhood in Hawaii and Kenya, his years at Harvard, his years as an Illinois Senator, the presidential campaign, and other related topics.

There are many, many great books to read in the LMC. There are also displays of many NEW books - great reading for a New Year!

Spotlight on LMC Science Students



Research in the LMC

Students, from elementary through high school, have been busy working on projects, speeches, typing essays, looking up college information, using the Internet for research, making Power Point presentations, and using the LMC resources for a wide variety of classroom assignments. The Foods students (taught by Mr. Knepfel) have been reading and doing Internet research on the "Food Pyramid." The second graders (in the classes of Mrs. Blokhuis, Mrs. Henske, and Mrs. Negro) have been learning about friendship and also about the differences and similarities of the human family. Mr. Gerlach's history students have been studying local Wisconsin history and working on assignments for Civics. Elementary art students have been looking at pictures of homes and different styles of architecture with Mrs. Ritter. Mrs. McLarnan has been teaching students about forest animals. The students in Mrs. Vann's Spanish classes have been busy creating special presentations. The art students of Mrs. Dernbach have been getting ideas for their creations by looking up cartooning and famous works of art. It's wonderful to have the LMC used by students of all ages and also the A-B Staff to enrich their classroom learning experiences.

FIT KIDS CHALLENGE

The Fit Kids Challenge is an activity based program that will motivate children to be physically active for the remaining part of the school year. This program was designed to get children moving and to raise awareness about the importance of physical activity. Physical inactivity is a growing concern nationwide and is known to increase the risk of obesity in adults and children.



How Does My Child Participate?

The program is simple: (1) register, (2) log physical activity, (3) attend Fit Kids Challenge events, and (4) Celebrate 100 hours of physical activity at your school's End of Challenge Celebration.

(1) **Register:** Complete the Fit Kids Challenge Official Entry Form in the corner of the brochure and return it to your child's school office or gym/PE teacher by February 12, 2010. You may pick up a brochure in Almond School at 1336 Elm Street, Almond, WI 54909.

(2) Log Physical Activity:

Your child logs his/her physical activity on the Activity Log located in the brochure. The challenge is to engage in 100 hours of physical activity from now until May 1, 2010. Each square on the map equals **one** hour of activity. Whenever your child engages in 1 hour of physical activity, he/she fills in 1 square on the map. An easy way to meet the 100 hour Challenge goal is to complete 1 hour of physical activity each day.

All physical activity <u>outside</u> of school counts toward earning that hour of daily activity. Sledding, building snow forts, skiing, skating, after school sports, hiking, riding bikes, playing tag, skipping rope, anything that gets your <u>adventure</u> 21 child's body moving counts.

(3) Attend Fit Kids Challenge Events:

Your child also has the opportunity to participate in fun, physically active community sponsored events. At each event, your child enters into a drawing for exciting prizes such as a **Wii game station, Wii Fit, custom-fit bike, and door prizes like memberships, activity gear, and other stuff.** For your child to be entered into the drawings, be sure they bring a ticket (located under the Activity Log) to each Fit Kids Challenge event. Your child must be present to win.

(4) Earn Admission into the End of Challenge Celebration:

By completing the 100 hours required in the Fit Kids Challenge, each child will be eligible to attend their school district's End of Challenge Celebration. To register your child: (1) complete the *Admission Card*, (2) attach the *Admission Card* to your child's completed Activity Log, and (3) turn these into your school office or gym teacher by May 1, 2010. Only elementary students can earn free admission to the End of Challenge Celebration.

The date, time, and location of your school district's End of Challenge Celebration will be announced closer to the completion of the Fit Kids Challenge.


Who Can Participate?



<u>Preschool Screening – Child Development Day</u>

The Almond-Bancroft School District will be holding preschool screening (Child Development Day) on Tuesday, February 23 between 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. at the Bancroft school. Children who plan to attend 4 yr. old Kindergarten in the fall are requested to attend. Children between the ages of 2 ½ and 4 that are currently not enrolled in a school provided program are also urged to attend. If you're worried about the way your baby or toddler is developing, the "Birth to Three" program will be screening children from 3 months of age through 2 ½ years. **Appointments are needed for all screenings** and should be scheduled prior to Feb. 19th.

Children will enjoy a number of fun activities designed to compare their play, socialization, motor skills, and overall developmental levels with other same-age children. Hearing and Vision screenings conducted by Portage County Health Dept. are included as part of the preschool screening. In addition, representatives and/or literature from various community services (Birth to Three, Family Resource Center, Head Start, etc.) will be available to provide information regarding services offered to families with young children.

Children born *prior* to June 1, 2007 should contact Sandy Barden at Almond-Bancroft Schools to schedule an appointment between 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. (366-2947 ext. 329). The screening will take approximately 1½ hours. Children born *after* June 1, 2007 should contact Sue Chapman at Birth to Three Services to schedule an appointment between 9:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. (342-0393). Children under the age of 2 ½ can be screened in approximately 45 minutes.

Note: The school district must locate, identify and evaluate ALL resident children with disabilities (including children with disabilities who attend private schools, regardless of the severity of the disability). The school district uses a special education screening program to locate and screen all children with suspected disabilities who are resident of the district and who have not graduated high school, to determine whether a special education referral is appropriate. Four-Year Old Kindergarten Registration

Four-year old kindergarten (4K) registration will coincide with the Preschool Screening on Tuesday, Feb. 23rd at the Bancroft school from 8:45 until 3:00. To register for 4K, children must be 4 years of age on or before Sept. 1, 2010. Please bring your child's birth certificate to verify his/her age. You will also need emergency contact information, immunization records and your family doctor and dentist's phone numbers. Registration must be completed on-site and will take about 20 minutes.
