## **4 YEAR OLD KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION PACKETS FOR THE 2015-16 SCHOOL YEAR**

**-Look for them in the mail soon!**



If you have a child turning 4 years old on or prior to Sept. 1, 2015, you will be receiving a registration packet in the mail during early February. If you do not receive the packet, that means we did not have your child on the district's census data, and you should contact the school so that we may get your updated contact information and get a packet in the mail. Contact Sandy Barden at (715) 366-2941, ext. 329, to get your registration packet today.

Completed registration packets are to be brought to the main office at the **Almond School**. No appointment is necessary. In order to verify your child's birthdate, we ask that you bring your child's ***original*** birth certificate (no copies). Office staff will simply confirm the date on the paperwork: no copies of the birth certificate will be made or retained by the school district. ## **PARENT INFORMATION FOR CHILDREN AGES 30 - 40 MONTHS**

In lieu of Child Development Days, the Almond-Bancroft School District will be mailing developmental questionnaires to the homes of children with birthdays between 8- 31-11 and 8-1-12. If you do not receive one in the mail, please contact Sandy Barden at (715) 366-2941 ext. 329.

Families that **return the questionnaire by February 20, 2015** will receive a special thank you gift that includes a "**Future Eagle**" t-shirt for your child with the new school logo! So please get those questionnaires filled out and returned to the main office at the Almond School.

**The school district must locate, identify and evaluate ALL resident children with disabilities (including children with disabilities who attend private schools, regardless of the severity of the disability).** The school district uses a special education screening program to locate and screen all children with suspected disabilities who are residents of the district and who have not graduated high school, to determine whether a special education referral is appropriate. 
### Packers Hall of Fame Kicks Off Annual "Tundra Tales" Reading Program



The event was created by CWC music teachers to give students from our small schools an opportunity to experience making music as part of much bigger groups. Students were encouraged to keep all the musical knowledge, skill, and excitement they gained that day, and take it back to their home towns to make their own bands and choirs even better. By the end of it I just had this feeling like if we could accomplish all that together in a day, there was probably nothing we couldn't do with all the rehearsal time we have back at our school." This year, we will celebrate National School Counseling Week by providing information to students about the school-wide counseling programs and opportunities available to them, quizzes and games, and a scavenger hunt!

## 2014-2015 HS Scheduling

## ACT Test Preparation for Juniors

We will be having a full day of test preparation for Juniors on February 3. This session will be focused on helping students become better prepared for the ACT Plus Writing and ACT WorkKeys tests that they will be taking in March. Students will review content topics and take practice tests in each of the subject areas. Additional practice tests will be available for those students that would like them. Just a reminder that the ACT Plus Writing test that will be taken as part of the required state testing this year for all Juniors CAN be used for college entrance!



## Transcripts for Seniors!

Seniors continuing on to a postsecondary educational institution next year, please be sure to let Ms. Spear know when you have decided where you will be attending and have been accepted. Also, be sure to complete a transcript request form so Ms. Spear can send a final transcript to the college of your choice at the end of the year to complete your application process.

## Minute Meetings



Mrs. McDonald and Ms. Spear will be conducting short face to face conferences called Minute Meetings with all students. During this time, we ask students a series of questions that allow us to check in with them regarding their academics, social relationships and interests for possible career choices. We also make sure to let students know we are available if they need to talk with us more in depth.

## Elementary Guidance

Recently, elementary students concluded a unit on self-awareness. Fifth graders spent the first part of the year exploring different learning styles. Not only did they identify their prominent learning style, but they explored some study habits and strategies geared to their style(s). As a final activity, they demonstrated their knowledge of self-awareness and learning styles in a game of Jeopardy.

Our current GIFTS concept is *Resistance*. Elementary students will be identifying situations that could be harmful to themselves or others and learning strategies to say no. Protective behaviors will be discussed and students will be able to identify good touch vs. bad touch and will learn the NO-GO-TELL Rule:

When in a situation in which touch makes you feel uncomfortable: Say NO

GO away from the person if possible

TELL a trusted adult right away



Students will be asked to identify adults both at home and at school that they could seek out if they needed help protecting themselves from a harmful situation.

## Wrestling Updates

The wrestling season is well on its way, but that doesn't mean it's too late to join. We will accept student athletes at all levels; youth, middle and high school. Interested athletes or parents can contact me for further information. The youth wrestling program will run through mid-March, and the middle and high school season through February.

The high school wrestlers are starting to gear up for upcoming tournament action. We have our conference meet, regional, sectional and state tournaments all taking place in February. Wrestlers must place 1<sup>st</sup> or 2<sup>nd</sup> at the regional tournament, held Feb. 14<sup>th</sup> at Manawa High School, to advance on to the sectional tournament at Bonduel, Feb. 21<sup>st</sup>. The State tournament is held in Madison Feb. 26<sup>th</sup>-28<sup>st</sup> at the Kohl Center.

We have several wrestlers that are doing well this season. During winter break the Warbirds traveled to the UW Oshkosh campus, where 64 teams competed in the Lourdes Academy Classic two day tournament. Cole Warzynski placed 4<sup>th</sup> out of 39 wrestlers in the 285 lb. weight class and Jack Lawlis placed 5<sup>th</sup> out of 41 wrestlers at the 220 lb. weight class. The second week in January the team traveled to Merrill where 25 schools competed. Cole Warzynski finished 1<sup>st</sup> at 285 lbs., Jack Lawlis finished 1<sup>st</sup> at 220 lbs., Kirby Lawlis finished 7<sup>th</sup> at 182 lbs., and Taylor Kim finished 9<sup>th</sup> at 285 lbs. Cole Warzynski currently leads the team with 33 wins and 3 losses followed by Jack Lawlis with 23 wins and 4 losses.


