She is a loving presence. She is always genuinely excited to be with the children. They look forward to seeing her every day and miss her when she cannot be at school. They absolutely love her!





## **Foodservice Operations Compete in Healthy Recipe Challenge**



Foodservice Operations students are currently developing and testing recipes to enter the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) *Recipe for Healthy Kids Challenge*. http://www.recipesforkidschallenge.com/ This contest involves teams of students in grades 4-12 creating healthy recipes in one of three categories (Whole Grains, Dark Green and Orange Vegetables, or Dry Beans and Peas). The effort is part of the USDA's *Let's Move* program, which is challenging school nutrition professionals, chefs, students, parents, and interested community members to create tasty, healthy, exciting new recipes for inclusion on school lunch menus across the country.

Samples of the prepared recipes were served in the school's cafeteria on December 13-15. Fellow A-B students will have an opportunity to rate the recipes. Afterward, recipes will be forwarded to *Kids Challenge* and reviewed by members of the USDA. Eventually, fifteen semi-finalist teams will have their recipes evaluated by a USDA judging panel during events held at participating schools. Recipes will also

be posted for online voting by the public to determine a "Popular Choice Winner". Winning teams will be invited to prepare their nutrition-packed meals alongside White House chefs. Grand prize is a \$3000 donation to the school's non-profit foodservice program. GOOD LUCK TEAMS!!!





#### **Winter RIF Distribution**




In December the last RIF distribution for the year 2010 took place. Students from 4K through 7th Grade, at Bancroft and Almond, were able to choose a book to keep as their very own - compliments of the federal government and the Almond-Bancroft School District. Four community members graciously volunteered to help with RIF. Our thanks go to **Bev Dachel**, **Leslie Burns**, **Doreen Zielinski**, and **Nancy Schulze** for coming in to help during the busy holiday season! In 2011 we hope to continue this great program. In January, **Jeff Rykal** will be working on the necessary

paperwork to renew our funding for another year. *If* approved, next year's RIF distribution will take place this coming spring. It's a wonderful program that brings book ownership to many students and lots of smiles on children's faces.

However, RIF (Reading Is Fundamental) is encountering a huge funding hurdle with Congress, as the House of Representatives looks to vote on the 2011 budget. How can you help? According to RIF, "Your elected representative will listen to you because the voice of a constituent is a powerful tool." To voice your support for RIF, go to the RIF site and check out the "Advocate Section" of the Reading Is Fundamental Web site. RIF is the largest children's and family nonprofit literacy organization in the United States. At present, 80% of RIF's budget comes from the government through the U.S. Department of Education. Without the federal funding, there will no longer be free books for our children. RIF has been around for 44 years and its program of distributing books to children and other literacy encouragement reach over four million kids every year. How sad it will be if RIF ends!


