

Almond-Bancroft School District Vision Statement

We are a collaborative community focused on continued growth in opportunities, choices, and expectations for all students. We prepare self-motivated and responsible students to become well-rounded and successful citizens.



Almond-Bancroft Schools were able to invest significantly in technology both for the classrooms and for background support. The district was able to upgrade the district servers and available memory, install building wide wireless capabilities, purchase additional SMART Boards (interactive white boards), acquire additional document cameras, purchase 10 iPads for a pilot program, purchase 75 netbooks that are housed on carts in the middle and high school, and also acquired the capabilities for students to utilize Web 2.0 tools through

Gaggle.Net.

With the continually growing use of the internet and the need for digital storage space, the district recognized the need to upgrade our servers and network to handle more devices and an ever rising need for document/picture/video storage. We now have a state of the art network that will be able to fit the needs of our students and staff for many years to come. The district also installed a wireless network that will bring mobility to our technology use in the classrooms. The wireless is currently being used by the iPads and the netbooks, but can be used by any device that is Wi-Fi enabled.

SMART Boards and/or projectors are now located in 95% of the classrooms in the district, giving staff and students instant classroom access to an infinite number of resources. No longer do we need to huddle around a single computer, or rely on video tapes and such. Now multimedia presentations/resources are just a click away and available to view for the entire class.

The addition of the netbooks and iPads have made a huge impact on student access to computers. A netbook is simply a smaller, cheaper version of a laptop computer. It functions very well for internet applications as well as basic Microsoft Office applications. The middle school students in the pictures are shown utilizing the new netbooks during their English class. The district initially purchased 50 netbooks, and the student use was great enough that an additional 25 were recently purchased and will be in use by mid-year. The netbooks allow

students to complete research projects, papers, and other multimedia projects.


The use of Gaggle.Net has allowed our students to step into the digital age, giving them the option to have digital "lockers" they can store their work in and be able to access it from anywhere have an internet thev connection.

The district is very proud to have had the ability to invest in our student's future by bringing their learning into the digital age.

### Positive, Behavior, Interventions, & Supports a.k.a PBIS

### **High School Updates:**

Throughout this Fall, the High School staff have been implementing the initial steps of PBIS. Beginning with a start-of-the -year kickoff, the staff modeled appropriate and non-appropriate behaviors for students in all areas of the school.

High School staff developed common behavior expectations and posted these in their classrooms.

Staff have been recording minor behavior infractions and that data is being analyzed to improve classroom instruction and student behavior.

Students have been receiving "green tickets" for demonstrating positive behaviors in school. Students may then submit their tickets for weekly prize drawings. Prize rewards have included a \$5.00 gas card, preferred parking space in the staff parking lot, free homework assignment pass, and free entrance to a sporting event pass.

We are continuing to work to improve the PBIS program in the high school to improve student behavior and learning. Continue to check the district newsletter for updates on PBIS in the spring.

### Middle School Students Raise funds for "Heifer International"

As a holiday charitable endeavor, our middle school students have voted to sponsor a \$10 "share" of a livestock animal for "Heifer International", an organization that helps families in developing countries fight poverty by learning to raise livestock for food and profit. Animals are used in dairying or meat production, wool for clothing and textiles, and manure for organic fertilizer on crops. The 8th graders have chosen to contribute for a share of a "Trio of Rabbits", 7th graders a share of a Water Buffalo, and the 6th graders voted to contribute a share for a llama. Students can make a big difference with small donation of a few coins.

Heifer International works in the areas of livestock and agriculture to develop programs that alleviate hunger and poverty. Their field staff is made up of agricultural specialists and their programs are very successful. 

# **Changes in the Almond-Bancroft Math Department:**

With scheduling for the 2012-13 school year right around the corner, it is important for parents and students to know about a few changes that will be taking place over the next few years in the middle and high school mathematics course offerings.

First, it is important to give a bit of background or history of some changes made at the state level that are affecting how and when we teach math. A few years back you might recall hearing about the state signing on to a federal initiative referred to as the Common Core State Standards. Tied to this was the promise of federal money to the states to help fund the initiative. Wisconsin, along with the majority of the states signed this agreement, which provided states with the same learning standards. This is a first, previous to this, each state had created it's own committee that studied and designed appropriate learning targets for the children of their state. At the time this was great! Local control of learning! There were a few major problems with this though. The first being the states varied widely in their expectations for student learning, making it very difficult to compare the level of education in one state to the next. The second problem is that our society is much more mobile than in the past, meaning families are much more willing to move from state to state to look for work. This has led to gaps in students learning when they have moved in from one state to another. The Common Core provides us with very specific learning targets that are measureable as well as comparable for accountability purposes. The Common Core standards for English, Math, and Science have already been released. All schools in WI will be held accountable to these learning targets as of 2014.

The good news is that WI already had some great state standards in place that the schools have been accountable for. Now districts throughout the state are aligning their curriculum to meet the needs of the Common Core. As our math department looked through these new expectations, they noticed the majority of changes in the middle school area. They found that the Common Core expectations were raised slightly, particularly in the area of algebra. So, this has led the team to move algebra to the 8<sup>th</sup> grade year, which is not far off from where we are now. In recent years, 20-40% of our 8<sup>th</sup> graders have been taking algebra already. In order to make this work, will be having to transition to some newly incorporated expectations in the 5<sup>th</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup>, and 7<sup>th</sup> grade levels so that students are fully prepared to take on algebra in 8<sup>th</sup> grade. For the 2012-13 school year, 8<sup>th</sup> grade students will be taking algebra and 7<sup>th</sup> grade students will be taking pre-algebra. Below is the progression of classes that will be fully implemented by the 2012-2014 school year:

<sup>\*</sup>Just a reminder to parents and students: math in middle school is required, but at the high school, only 2 credits are required to graduate, and minimum of 3 are required for attending a four-year university.






