Notes from the Administrator....

As I complete my second year in the Almond-Bancroft School District I am already anxious to get things started for next year. We will be looking to expand class offerings, strengthen our reading program, and continue to work toward meeting the needs of our students. One of our goals will be to provide the "Complete Education" for our students. Recently I had the opportunity to attend an educational conference in Appleton. I would like to share the information that was presented and discussed. The presenter was Ian Jukes, Director of The InfoSavvy Group of British Columbia, Canada. Mr. Jukes specializes in curriculum development. He works closely with Ted McCain who is Coordinator of Instructional Technology for Maple Ridge Secondary School in Vancouver, B.C. The question that was asked is "What is a Complete Education?". First is the acculturation of an individual, which simply means passing on the accumulated knowledge and wisdom of our society to the next generation. Students begin by learning basic skills, such as reading, so they explore and comprehend the wealth of materials and literature. Examples of a complete education would include:

- An understanding of history, geography, local as well as global.
- Exposure to the languages, customs, and beliefs of cultures around the world.
- An understanding of how government functions at all levels.
- An understanding of the environment.
- Skill in mathematical calculations.
- The ability to express one's ideas clearly in written and spoken form.
- Reading for reflection and personal enjoyment.
- Exposure to the creative expression of ideas through the visual and performing arts.
- Knowledge of how to take care of the body and having an appreciation for the concepts of healthy living and lifelong activity

This has been the focus of traditional education. This is not and cannot be the only essential component of a complete education. *Acquisition of practical problem-solving skills* is equally important to a complete education. This component will enable students to successfully apply their learning to real-life situations in the workplace and in their personal lives. We have not done a good job of addressing the second component of a complete education. We need to restructure instruction in such a way that traditional content in all subject areas can be delivered in such a way that students develop the practical problem-solving skills they need. We will be introducing this concept to our staff and community during the 2009-10 school year.

<u>The 2009 Community Survey</u> is a tool that will provide us with data that will assist us in making our district one that is better understood and will meet the needs of our students and community. I encourage you to take a moment and complete the survey which can be found on our school's website www.abschools.k12.wi.us or simply call Trina at 366.2941 extension 422 and request a copy be mailed to your attention. Please keep in mind that the survey is completely anonymous.


High School Student of the Week April 20 - 24

Please don't smoke. If you don't smoke now, don't start. If you do smoke, please quit. Here are some ways you can quit using tobacco.


- 1. Think about what it will do to your body if you don't quit.


