#### ALMOND-BANCROFT STUDENT RECEIVES THE ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE SCHOLARSHIP



Adam Bradley has been selected to receive the 2008 Academic Excellence Scholarship by earning the spot of valedictorian of the 2007-2008 graduating class.

Academic Excellence Scholarships, established in 1989 by the state Legislature, are awarded to Wisconsin high school seniors who have the highest grade

point average in each public and private high school throughout the State of Wisconsin. The number of scholarships each high school is eligible for is based on total student enrollment. Almond-Bancroft, with a high school enrollment below 500, is able to award one senior this scholarship. In order to receive a scholarship, a student must be enrolled on a full-time basis by September 30th of the academic year following the academic year in which he or she was designated as a scholar, at a participating University of Wisconsin, Wisconsin Technical College, or independent institution in the state. The value of the scholarship is \$2,250 per year, to be applied towards tuition. Half of the scholarship is funded by the state, while the institution matches the other half.

Adam has been very active in extracurricular activities at Almond High School including participating in the class government, National Honors Society, High Quiz Bowl, prom and homecoming courts, theater, forensics, basketball, baseball, football, band, and choir while maintaining excellent grades. Adam is planning on attending UW-La Crosse this fall and will be majoring in biology with a biomedical science emphasis.

#### ACT Workshop a Success! By Miss Spencer

On Monday, March 31<sup>st</sup>, Almond-Bancroft hosted an ACT workshop. This workshop introduced students to test taking strategies in the four main sections of the test (English, Reading, Math, and Science) and the writing section. They were given a testing experience in each of these areas and then evaluated to show where their strengths and weaknesses were. Students were also taught the importance of pacing yourself throughout the test and what an ACT score actually means. Twenty Almond-Bancroft students participated



in the workshop along with 6 students from Amherst. John Meinke, the Curriculum Consultant from CESA 5 who ran the workshop, stated that the group was very motivated and well behaved and all should do well on the actual test. Below are some comments written by students who attended the workshop:

"I feel like I am a lot more prepared for the ACT and this classes really helped."

"I'm glad I had the opportunity to take this workshop. I learned a lot. I had no idea about what kinds of questions would be on the ACT until now. Thank you for everything!"

"I learned a lot of new information from this day. I found everything helpful. If I hadn't taken this course, I don't think I would do good on my ACT. I learned how to manage my time and that's what is really going to help me in the end."

"I thought it was very well coordinated and was very helpful to me. It was a good experience."

"I liked that we got a chance to see what's coming. I have a better understanding of what to expect and what to study. I'm not as scared going into this now."

"Very good experience and makes me more confident for the test."

## A BIG THANK YOU!

I would like to thank all the parents and students for their cooperation in the change of our daily schedule. Many of you are wondering why the change.

The state of Wisconsin and the Department of Public Instruction have requirements that mandate the number of days and hours of instruction for students in Wisconsin. Our district does have the required days but we fall short in grades 7-12 for hours of instruction. The requirements are as follows; kindergarten instruction must equal at least 437 hours, grades 1-6 instruction must equal at least 1050 hours, and for grades 7-12 instruction must equal at least 1137 hours. In kindergarten through grades 6 we have more than the required number of hours even counting the two snow days and two early dismissal days. In grades 7-12 we fall about 20 hours short in the time of instruction when you take away the time off for inclement weather.

In an effort to make up this time the administration and members of the Almond Area Education Association reviewed options and together presented the concept of adding 33 minutes per day starting April 21<sup>st</sup> through the end of the school year. **In addition, school will be dismissed at 2:05 on the last day (June 6) instead of the 12:05 time**.

By making these adjustments we will fall within the guidelines of the Department of Public Instruction. Had our district not made up this time, we could have lost state aid.

For the 2008-09 school year, we will be adding 1 minute per class per day in grades 6-12 so that we have 2.66 days built into our calendar.

We are <u>soaring</u> with Eagle Pride!!


In the past month we have received a number of generous donation from our community members, alumni, and area businesses. On April 20th, we held a chicken dinner and sold 650 meals!

#### Celebrate!

El día de los niños/El día de los libros (Children's Day/Book Day) is a celebration of children, families, and reading held annually on April 30. The celebration emphasizes the importance of advocating literacy for children of all linguistic and cultural backgrounds.

#### Celebremos!

El 30 de abril es una fecha muy significativa para los niños. Se celebra el día de los niños y de los libros. Esta celebración se conoce como El día de los niños/ El día de los libros, y celebra la alegría y las maravillas de la infancia y la importancia de los libros en nuestra vida.

This American celebration is modeled after the National Children's Day Celebrations held in Mexico since 1925. The National Children's Day/Book Day was started in the U.S. in 1996. According to the founder, poet and children's author, Pat Mora, "There is not only a global society outside of the United States, but also one within the United States."

To help support multicultural literacy, the LMC has a special collection of Spanish books which includes titles from all age levels: early childhood to adult. There are fiction and nonfiction books. There are history books and travel books. There are books in Spanish with companion volumes in English, and there are also many bilingual titles. This month there are two special displays of the Spanish books - in the windows of the Secondary LMC and also in the Elementary LMC.

Some of the titles include: Senor Felipe's Alphabet Adventure/El Alfabeto Espanol; Laughing Out Loud, I Fly - Poems in English and Spanish; Spanish Short Stories/Cuentos Hispanicos; Las Manchas del Sapo/How the Toad Got His Spots; My First Spanish Word Book; Family/La Familia; Little Red Riding Hood/Caperucita Roja; Historias de Mexico/Stories from Mexico; Spanish Bilingual Dictionary; Los Contrarios/Opposites; Spanish Math Terms; En Pocas Palabras/In A Few Words - A Compendium of Latino Wit & Wisdom; Las Chronicas de Narnia - El Lion, La Bruja y El Ropero; Cuando Tropece Contigo; Latino visions - Contemporary Chicano, Puerto Rican, and Cuban American Artists; Zorro; plus many more books.

#### **Nevelson-Inspired Artwork Donated to the LMC**

Fourth grade students in the art class of **Sarah Ritter** have created fascinating sculptures based on the work of artist Louise Nevelson, a Russian-born American Abstract Expressionist Sculptor (1899-1988). Nevelson was one of the most important American sculptors of the twentieth century. Her art can be found in almost every museum in Europe and America such as the Smithsonian American Art Museum in Washington, D.C. and the Guggenheim Museum in New York City. Many of her sculptures included wood assemblages which ranged in size from the small and personal to the large and monumental. The Elementary LMC currently has a display of similarly designed wooden sculptures created by the 4th graders.



One group of fourth grade students who worked cooperatively to make a Nevelson tower of cubicles have donated their inspired artwork. They are (in the accompanying photo from left to right): **Austin Bunders, Jordan Kealiher, Shayla Newby, Carlos Cabral. Johl Turzinski, Kyle Merila,** and **Cole Warzynski**. Behind them is a photo of one of Nevelson's sculptures as well as their excellent example of her artistic style - an assemblage made out of wood which is painted stark black and consisting of intricate geometric forms grouped within box-like frames. A light shines on their artwork to emphasize the shadows and different shapes. My thanks to these students for donating this intriguing work of art to the Elementary LMC!

When you enter the LMC, you can hear the faint clinking of these moving pieces of art as they sway to the air from the ceiling vents. These windchimes are fragile hanging art, but they will delight everyone who sees them!

Roy Danforth called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm.

#### School Forest Update by Mrs. Plaisance

On April 16, the Almond-Bancroft Board of Education reviewed and voted to approve the Carrie Frost School Forest Education Plan. The Education Plan was developed by the School Forest Committee of staff members with a grant from the Wisconsin Environmental Education Board, who also approved the plan in March. With the Education Plan in place, the district is eligible to apply for future grant monies from WEEB. We also now have both educational and management goals with which to increase utilization of the school forest as an environmental education facility. Several trips are currently being planned for the month of May, and students from several grade levels will be participating in environmental education and forestry lessons at the forest. The Wisconsin School Forest Specialist, Jeremy Solin, recommended that an education plan be developed for the Carrie Frost school forest property, as it is the most accessible of the school forest properties owned by the district. It also has a larger degree of diversity and the trees are of a maturity that allows for study of a more developed and varied commercial forest ecosystem. The regenerative growth from previous harvests and storm damage also offers opportunities for students to examine how forest communities carry on over time. Environmental education topics can be explored in any curricular area at the school forest, and it is our hope that teachers utilize this resource in future years to enhance the quality of the education of students here at Almond-Bancroft.

In addition, at the March 31 meeting of the Almond Rod and Gun Club, ideas for projects at the school forest were discussed. Members of the club would like to be involved in improving the Carrie Frost School Forest site by having a workday to remove invasive locust and box-elder saplings, which was a management plan goal for the school forest. They also proposed to assist in the installation of trail markers for a self-guided interpretive nature trail at the school forest, and they are looking into the possibility of providing a portable lavatory to meet the needs of students while they are participating in activities at the school forest during the month of May. We are thankful for their consideration in suggesting and volunteering to do these projects at the school forest!

Thanks to Mr. Dan Folan, Mr. Gene Reineking, Mr. Matt Jakowski, and Mr. Art Pagel for encouraging discussion and participation in environmental volunteerism on behalf of the Almond Rod and Gun Club.


Students will be screened by a Faculty Council consisting of five members of the faculty. This year, eight students are being considered for membership.


