<u>High School Forensics Students</u> <u>Earn Gold Medal</u> <u>At State Contest</u>


Cheyeanna Schober and Carly Rast earned a perfect score


Family and Consumer Education students enrolled in Foods II prepared desserts recently for several different Friends of Music fundraisers.



ALMOND-BANCROFT STUDENT RECEIVES THE ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE SCHOLARHSIP & CLASS OF 2009 VALEDICTORIAN



Cameron Olson has been selected to receive the 2009 Academic Excellence Scholarship by earning the spot of valedictorian of the 2008-2009 graduating

Academic Excellence Scholarships, established in 1989 by the state Legislature, are awarded to Wisconsin high school seniors who have the highest grade point average in each public and private high school throughout the State of

Wisconsin. The number of scholarships each high school is eligible for is based on total student enrollment. Almond-Bancroft, with a high school enrollment below 500, is able to award one senior this scholarship. In order to receive a scholarship, a student must be enrolled on a full-time basis by September 30th of the academic year following the academic year in which he or she was designated as a scholar, at a participating University of Wisconsin, Wisconsin Technical College, or independent institution in the state. The value of the scholarship is \$2,250 per year, to be applied towards tuition. Half of the scholarship is funded by the state, while the institution matches the other half.

Cameron has been an all-around athlete and student all four years of his high school career. He was in Football, Basketball, Quiz Bowl, and the school plays all four years of high school, and he was in Track & Field and Baseball for two years each. He was also in the National Honors Society for 2 years, his senior year as the Vice President, and has been a Big Brother to an elementary student the last two years as well. Cameron is planning on attending UW-Parkside this fall and will be majoring in Sports & Fitness Management. He chose this field because he loves sports and wants to help people stay active, be healthy, build friendships, and learn the importance of teamwork.

National Honor Society Membership Candidacy

To be eligible for membership consideration, students must have a cumulative grade point average of 3.2. Additionally, potential members must meet high standards of leadership, service, and character. Members of the sophomore class will be evaluated by a Faculty Council.

Leadership is based on a student's role as a participant in school and community activities, and election to offices. The service requirement is met by those actions taken by the student on the behalf of others, without personal compensation. Also reviewed is the student's attitude toward any service project. Character is measured in terms of integrity, behavior, ethics, and cooperation with both students and faculty.

Students will be screened by a Faculty Council consisting of five members of the faculty.

There will always be opportunities to remind kids that they cannot always control the actions of others but that **they are in charge of themselves**!

Our final G.I.F.T.S. word for the year is FORGIVENESS. We will define it as follows: To stop blaming or feeling angry toward yourself or others. It will take self-discipline to forgive our friends and family for hurting us when we may really want to retaliate instead. As always, keep praising students for the virtues they demonstrate.

It was a very exciting year! Our goals to add large scale aluminum bleachers to the football field, improve the outfield at both the **Joseph J. Connor** baseball and softball fields, and provide underground

sprinkler systems to enhance and maintain all of these fields, were astonishingly achieved in just 7 months! The infields were upgraded at both the baseball and softball diamonds over a year ago, and with the community's help we continued the progress.

These improvements benefit grade school, middle school, and high school football as well as little league and high school baseball and softball. These upgrades will have long term benefits. The bleachers, sprinkler system, and outfields will last for many years with minor maintenance costs. It also benefited the school by giving us the privilege of hosting our first football playoff game ever, with hopefully many more to come!

We initiated our plans by having a brand new well put in at the complex. The school had a building installed to protect and maintain the new well, as well as provide storage space for the sports programs that need it there. Our hope is to further develop the complex, but the progress is greatly dependent on your continued kindness and generosity.

Our new goals are to replace the existing press box, develop practice fields for the youth and high school football teams, install permanent fencing to protect these facilities, and replace the P.A. system with some new sound equipment. We are researching the possibility of cooperating with the village and utilizing some of their land for the practice fields. We again want to offer our sincerest thanks and gratitude to all those who gave their time, resources and money to make our initial dreams a reality for our kids and communities.
