Once again, it is the time of year to set the district levy. I would like to explain the process and procedure that is used to determine the levy. Each year the *Department of Revenue* sets the district's property value (in 2007 the property value in the AB School District was set at \$168,780,302). The DOR set this year's value at \$182,034,610 or just over a 7.9% increase. At the October 15, 2008, school board meeting, the board set the school levy for the 2008 school year. The levy is comprised of two funds: Fund 10 (money used for the operation of the school district) and Fund 39 (money used to pay long term building debt). The levy for 2008 is as follows:

Fund 10 \$1,039,091 Fund 39 \$439,260 Total levy \$1,478,351

For tax purposes, this levy will have a mill rate of \$8.12 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. The 2008 mill rate is \$.42 less than last year's. I would be happy to answer any questions you may have regarding the budget or the process/procedure used to determine school taxes. 

Hopefully this will help the weed situation on the sports fields!





News From Sra. Lisa Vann



Students in the Almond High School Spanish classes participated in a contest that celebrates "El Día de Los Muertos" (The Day of the Dead) honoring a traditionally Mexican holiday on November 2nd annually honoring the lives of people we have lost in a time of celebration. The contest involves making the traditional coffin cake filled with sweets and decorated with lively colors to acknowledge the sweet additive to our lives received simply by knowing the person(s) we lost that year. Students baked the cakes and decorated them and the cakes were on display to be voted on the same week so that they could be eaten and enjoyed by all of the students. Señora Vann would like to personally thank all of the faculty and families that support the cultural events students use to study the language and culture of countries around the globe. Mr. Knepfel has allowed us to utilize his kitchen several times in the FACE room. Spanish students have already had the privilege of sampling tamales, salsa, churros con chocolate, máscaras del Día de Los Muertos, piñatas, and castanuelas (castanets). We look forward to even more cultural events throughout the rest of the year. Gracias!

Dia de los Muertos History:

Dia De Los Muertos is one of Mexico's traditional holidays reuniting and honoring beloved ancestors, family and friends. It is an ancient and enduring ritual when the living commune with the dead - a mystical night when the veil is lifted between their two realms and they may share a day together. The historical roots of this celebration date back to the pre-Hispanic cultures of Meso-America of the indigenous people, especially the Nahua (Aztecs, Mayans, Toltecas, Tlaxcaltec, Chichimec, Tecpanec) and others native to Mexico more than 3,000 years. When the Spaniards conquered the country, this indigenous custom was rooted so deeply that, after five centuries of colonization, it has continued to survive and remain as celebrated as in its first days.

Throughout each period in Mexican culture, death seems to hold no terror. In Mexican art, legends, and religion, death has not been a mysterious and fearful presence but a realistic recognizable character as much a part of life as life itself. Dia De Los Muertos expresses this perspective: it is not a mournful commemoration but a happy and colorful celebration where Death takes a lively, friendly expression and is not frightening or strange. There is no place for sorrow or weeping for this could be interpreted as a discourteous to the dead relatives who are visiting gladly. Indigenous people believed that souls did not die, that they continued living in Mictlán (Place of Death) a special place for them to finally rest. On Dia De Los Muertos, tradition holds that the dead return to earth to visit their living relatives. It is believed that although these relatives can't see them, they can surely feel them. This night is an important feast and evocation. It is a time when family members share memorable stories that evoke the lives of their ancestors. Offerings and altars are created to welcome and commemorate the dead. Marigolds and incense are offered in abundance because it is believed their aromatic scents guide the dead to the place where the feast is being held. A profusion of candles dispels the darkness just as the souls are being illuminated from the shadows of death. Altars are created with photos, mementos, fruit, bread, and other favorite things of the ancestors being welcomed and honored. The artifacts of these altars also provide the opportunity to teach children about those who came before them.

Dia De Los Muertos is a time of celebration on remembrance. It is also a time to come to terms with our mortality and become aware of the cycle of life and death. Rather than deny and fear death this event teaches us to accept and contemplate the meaning of mortality.
