### Capitol ceremony celebrates 2010-11 Wisconsin Schools of Recognition

MADISON — State Superintendent Tony Evers praised Almond-Bancroft Elementary School for being among 153 schools in the state that received Wisconsin School of Recognition honors for the 2010-11 school year during a special October 18th ceremony at the State Capitol in Madison.

Evers welcomed, from left: Jeff Rykal, PreK-12 Principal, Amanda Negro, 1st Grade Teacher, and Greg Kehring, 4th Grade Teacher, to the recognition event. To be recognized, schools must be among those with the highest poverty rates in the state, have met adequate yearly progress goals under federal education law for the past two years, and have student achievement on state mathematics and reading assessments that is higher than schools with similar poverty levels and grade configurations.

"Partnerships among teachers, parents, administrators, school staff members, and the community contribute to the academic success of students in schools that receive this honor," Evers said.

"The Almond-Bancroft School District is extremely proud of the hard work by the staff, students, and community that made this award possible. It is a testament to the dedication by the staff and community to provide the best possible learning opportunities for the students of our district," said Jeff Rykal, PreK-12 Principal for Almond-Bancroft School District. This is the forth consecutive School of Recognition award for the Almond-Bancroft Elementary School, and fifth overall award.

#### This is Your Brain on Music

"This is Your Brain on Music: The Science of a Human Obsession," is a new book written by Dan Levitin, a former record producer, now director of the Levitin Laboratory for Musical Perception, Cognition and Expertise at McGill University, Montreal. Mr. Levitin believes music is a window into the human soul. We turn on music while driving, we listen to music at parties, clubs, and restaurants, we dance to music, shop to music, sing in the shower, and attend concerts. Yet the psychological importance of this part of our lives is not commonly understood. At universities around the world, scientists are working to understand the cognitive function of music. When we listen to music, what happens in our brain? What makes a gifted musical performer? Why do we move to music? Why does music affect our emotions? Does music have a biological function? How did we become a species that creates, performs, and listens to music? "This is Your Brain on Music" explores these questions and provides insight into fascinating research currently being conducted, not only in departments of music, but in psychology, neuroscience, medicine, computer science, and linguistics.

We look forward to a year of musical human obsession at Almond-Bancroft and to assisting in the life enrichment of our students and community. Please join us this year as we work to raise funds to support our band and choir students. The next Friends of Music meeting is Monday, November 15, at 7:00 p.m. in the Band room.

#### **Attention Parents!**

Although elementary students have already brought home a letter outlining LMC policies and a list of ways to take good care of books, Mrs. Van Ert and I have been seeing too many damaged books this fall. There is an important role that we would like you to play. We would appreciate it if you could do the following with your child:

\*Have a special and safe place to keep the library books - away from pets, younger siblings, walkways, and food and beverage items.

\*Have a suitable bag/backpack available to help protect the books from the elements.

\*Remind your child to have clean hands and to turn the pages from the upper right-hand corner.

\*Use a bookmark to mark the place where you or your child have left off reading.

\*If a book is damaged, PLEASE write a note explaining what happened. Explain to your child that they must tell their classroom teacher or bring the damaged book directly to the LMC. They should not just drop it in the book bin without telling anyone - especially if there are wet pages, rips, or a broken binding. We need to try to repair the book *as soon as possible*!

\*Read the books to your child or listen to them read to you. This is very important. Take an interest in what your child is reading.

\*Have a comfortable place to read and a place with good lighting.

\*Discuss the books with your child. Ask "who, what, why, and how" questions. Talk about the pictures. Help your child pronounce proper names and uncommon words.

\*Have the books returned no later than the due date; there should be a date due slip located in the book pocket. \*Encourage your child to be responsible.

\*AND, let your child see <u>you</u> reading at home - whether a newspaper, magazine, or a book. Let's work together to promote a love for books and reading!

Even though these book care rules were discussed with all of the elementary classes, we really need your support at home. If, with your help, we are successful, our students will carry the habit of treating books with care throughout their school days and beyond. 


