
Capitol ceremony celebrates 2013-14 Wisconsin Title I Schools of Recognition

MADISON — State Superintendent Tony Evers praised Almond-Bancroft for being among 167 schools in the state that received Wisconsin Title I School of Recognition honors for the 2013-14 school year during a special Oct. 8 ceremony at the State Capitol in Madison.

Evers welcomed, from left: Brenda Ramczyk and Jeff Rykal, to the recognition event. Special recognition during the event included 14 High-Achieving schools and 26 High-Progress schools, with six schools earning both High-Achieving and High-Progress honors. There were five schools that earned Wisconsin Title I School of Recognition honors for 10 consecutive years, and nine schools that earned the award for a fifth consecutive year.

"Partnerships among teachers, parents, administrators, school staff members, and the community contribute to the academic success of students in schools that receive this honor," Evers said.

Almond-Bancroft Elementary has received Wisconsin School of Recognition honors for seven consecutive years and eight years in total.

Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS)

Our school is taking part in the Wisconsin Online Youth Risk Behavior Survey this winter. The survey will ask 6th-12th grade students about behaviors that result in injuries, tobacco use, and alcohol and other drug use, risk associated with sexual activity, dietary behavior, and physical activity. Students will be asked to fill out a computer-based questionnaire that takes about 25 minutes to complete. They will take the survey during regular class time. Some students might find certain questions to be sensitive, but they are able to skip any

question that they do not wish to answer. This <u>anonymous</u> survey has been designed to protect your child's privacy and our school will not receive individual student answers. Students will not put their names on the survey and no class or student will ever be mentioned by name in a report of the results. **The aggregated results of this survey will help students in the future by influencing our school's health and safety programs (including bullying and harassment)**. We would like all middle/high school students to take part in the survey, but the survey is voluntary.

Please contact Erika Spear, the 8-12 School Counselor, if you have any questions or concerns regarding this survey. If you <u>do not</u> want your child to take part in the survey, contact Erika Spear at 715-366-2941 x414 no later than November 30, 2013. If you have no objection to your child taking part in the survey, you do not need to do anything. Thank you.

Elementary GIFTS (Classroom Guidance)

In GIFTS lessons we have been:

- → Learning what "good character " is.
- → Identifying people in our lives and famous people with good character.
- → Focusing on what honesty looks like in everyday life.
- → Exploring why honesty is an important character trait.
- Learning why honesty is important in connection to various careers.



Minute Meetings

This year, Mrs. McDonald and Ms. Spear will be conducting short face to face conferences called Minute Meetings with all middle school students. During this time, we ask students a series of questions that allow us to check in with them regarding their academics, social relationships and interests for possible career choices. We also make sure to let students know we are available if they need to talk with us more in depth. Mrs. McDonald will also be conducting Minute Meetings with elementary students throughout the year.

ASVAB: Not Just for the Military

The ASVAB Career Exploration Program is a civilian-based program that can help all students take steps toward finding a career that's right for them. Students do not need to be interested in the military to take the ASVAB. They can benefit from the Program whether they plan to pursue further education after high school or enter the workforce right away. The first step towards finding a career is to spend some time finding out about yourself. The ASVAB Career Exploration Program includes tests and activities that help students identify their interests and provide information about their Verbal Skills, Math Skills, and Science and Technical Skills. It lets them know how their interests and skills relate to the demands of more than 400 occupations to help students start making educational and career plans.

The ASVAB is being given this year on Tuesday, December 3 at 8:10 am. All Sophomores, Juniors, and Seniors will be encouraged to sign up for this free career exploration tool closer to the testing date.





April Chilsen, Breeley Warzynski, and Lauren Dykes of the Almond-Bancroft FFA Chapter attended the Wisconsin Association of FFA FIRE Conference, October 12 at the Fox Valley Technical College Campus in Appleton, Wisconsin. FIRE stands for "Foundations in Reaching Excellence." The conference helps young FFA members discover opportunities in the FFA organization and gain valuable leadership skills. This is one of three conferences held around the state of Wisconsin for seventh, eighth and ninth grade FFA members. Over 600 members will attend these three conferences during September and October.

The State FFA FIRE Conference is designed to inform beginning FFA members about the FFA and motivate them to participate in its many activities. Students learned about communication skills, social skills, goal setting, FFA awards and programs, and opportunities in agriculture along with developing leadership skills to help them be effective members in their local chapters.

The conference is conducted by the 2013-2014 State FFA Officer Team along with assistance from the FVTC-Appleton Post Secondary Agricultural Student Organization. The conference was centered around the theme "Survivor – FFA Edition". All of the state officers encouraged students that attended the FIRE Conference to set goals for their FFA involvement and meet people from around the state who can help them reach those goals.

Not only does this conference help students understand the FFA organization and all its opportunities, but helps them develop skills in meeting people, working with others and setting goals with a plan of action. "In the FFA, we assist members starting in seventh grade to develop skills they will need for future careers and opportunities," said Cheryl Zimmerman, State FFA Executive Director. "FFA develops the whole person and these young members are taking a step in the right direction."

El estado de Wisconsin ha cambiado la manera de identificación de los estudiantes con específicas incapacidades de aprendizaje (SLD). Después del 1º de diciembre 2013, todas las evaluaciones de SLD iniciales de estudiantes de escuelas públicas utilizarán la información de las intervenciones para hacer decisiones de elegibilidad.

Este artículo es para informarlos que a partir del 3 de septiembre 2013 las evaluaciones de SLD iniciales en las escuelas de Almond-Bancroft comenzarán a utilizar la información de la respuesta de un estudiante de intervenciones intensivas, con base científica o con evidencia, cuando haciendo decisiones de elegibilidad de educación especial.

Este cambio en los procedimientos de calificaciones serán implementados en nuestro distrito usando una sistema conocida como 'Repuesta de Intervención' (RTI). RTI abarca las académicas y comportamientos para todos los estudiantes. RTI está diseñado para captar las luchas académicas o comportamientos al inicio y para proporcionar intervenciones que han sido probados de trabajar. FAQ's:

Do my photos have to be the same size as the template?

No. We have the ability to scan and/or resize photos as needed.

Do I have to have the exact number of words specified on a sample template?

No. It is suggested that you stay around that number in order to keep text legible, though.

How do I indicate which photo I want to go where?

Simply write the location lightly on the back of the photo and we'll make sure it goes there.

Do I have to type my text?

No. You may handwrite your text, however, it may be more clear to attach a typed copy of the text you'd like to include your ad. All writing will be recreated AS IT WAS WRITTEN, so legible writing or copies of text are preferred.

Can I submit digital photos?

Yes. You may submit them by emailing Ms. Stiebs at <u>dstiebs@abschools.k12.wi.us</u>. Digital files do need to be at a resolution of at least 300 dpi, though, otherwise they will not be useable for yearbook publishing. When scanning photos, most scanning programs have a "custom" section where you can change your resolution to at least 300.

If the yearbook doesn't come out until the end of the year, why do I need to submit this so early?

The yearbook is created all throughout the year. Many schools need to get pages in as early as October and need your ads to help them reach that goal.


Will I receive my photos back?


Yes. Your photos will be kept in a safe place until your ad is created. Your yearbook advisor will then have them available for pick up or will be returned to you by mail.
