What Is G.I.F.T.S.?

Our school has a unique developmental guidance program called G.I.F.T.S. (Giving Individuals Freedom To Succeed). You might hear it called classroom guidance as well. It is just part of a total PreK-12 School Counseling Program that is based on the Wisconsin Comprehensive School Counseling Model [WCSCM] & American School Counseling Association National Model.

Each year, we will focus on three character traits that we believe are necessary to create a safe learning environment and positive school climate. The traits we will be exploring this year are:

Respect-----Responsibility-----Resolution

In addition to working with the GIFTS program, the elementary counselor is also available for individual and group counseling which may focus on topics such as: self-esteem, peer relationships, family change, grief and academic success. 2010-2011/ LMC Times

The **4K and Kindergarten** rooms at the Bancroft School have classroom libraries managed by the individual teachers. There are also Easy Readers and Pre-school books kept in a special box for when the 4K students are in the Elementary LMC at Almond.

All **Students in Grades 1-5** have regularly scheduled classroom times to use the Elementary LMC each week. They also use the LMC when they are working on special projects, in reading groups, being tutored, or searching for Accelerated Reader books. Parents of elementary students should have received a letter (brought home by their children) explaining library procedures, information about overdue and lost books, and a schedule designating which days their children have scheduled library times. Except for Accelerated Readers or special circumstances, no elementary students may have more than two library books checked out at one time.

Secondary Students (Middle School and High School) use the LMC for specific research projects, to check out and return library books, to take tests, to do word processing, to work on individual assignments for specific classes, to use the computers for information or Power Point projects, and when teachers bring their entire classes to get books or do research. Middle School students also have a regular schedule to use the LMC once a week during their English classes.

This will provide students and parents the option to call the hotline to listen to a recorded message containing the homework assignments for that school day. They will be separated by MS and HS – listen to the voice prompts. Almond-Bancroft Schools hope that this service will promote better communication between school and community, as well as parent and student.



Almond Immunization Clinic October 18

Almond Elementary School- 3:00-5:30pm Immunizations offered include those recommended for infants and children through 18 years, including school required vaccines and seasonal flu vaccine. Immunizations offered for adults include Tetanus/Pertussis, Pneumonia Hepatitis A and B, Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR), Varicella (Chicken Pox) And HPV (Gardasil) available for males and females 11- 26 years. Flu vaccine is not available for adults through Portage County Health Department

> *Hosted by Portage County Public Health Nurses.* Parent/guardian must accompany child less than 18 years old.

NO appointments are needed during this clinic time. Vaccines are \$5.00 each except adult Pneumonia is \$40.00 Fees can be waived if unable to pay (except for adult Pneumonia)

Attention Parents

Tdap and Varicella immunization requirements have changed.

To improve protection against varicella (chicken pox) and pertussis (whooping cough) additional doses have been added to the school requirements. Students who have been current with their vaccines may now need additional vaccines to remain current.

These requirements are being phased in by school grades. For the 2010-11 school year the Wisconsin Student Immunization Law requires students to have completed:

- 2 doses of varicella (chickenpox) vaccine for students entering grades Kindergarten, 1, 2, 6, 7, 8 and 12 in the fall of 2010.
- 1 dose of **tetanus**, **diphtheria and acellular pertussis vaccine** (**Tdap**) for students entering grades **6 through 12** in the fall of 2010.

*The Tdap vaccine is required at this time to boost the pertussis protection. Pertussis is only available in a combined vaccine with tetanus (Tdap). To boost the protection for pertussis, Tdap will be required if it has been more than 5 years since your student has received a tetanus containing vaccine.



Educating children with autism is a challenge for both parents and teachers. These children are individuals first and foremost with unique strengths and weaknesses. Some may be of average to above-average intelligence, while others may be below average. 



Dear Parent(s),

The School year is well underway. We are off to a good start. Did you know that breakfast is the most important meal of your child's day? It provides the nutrients and energy he/she needs to concentrate in school. Research shows that kids who eat breakfast get better grades, pay more attention in class, and behave better. Help your youngster begin his day on the right foot. To help our students to get off to a good start we received a grant from the State for smoothie makers. Connie, our cook, has been working diligently making smoothies for our students. Everyday she has been selling out, she is trying hard to give everyone a chance to have a smoothie. We are up to 225 breakfasts served each day. Which is over half of our lunch count. That is great!

I also want you to know ...Chocolate Milk is Strong—for Minds, Bodies and School Meals! Muscles fueled with chocolate milk are muscles fueled with nutritious energy. Loaded with calcium, Vitamin D, protein and other essential nutrients* chocolate milk is a power-packed beverage that kids love to drink. Did you know that when chocolate milk is not offered at school, kids miss out on nutrition? Studies show that when chocolate milk is not an option in the school meal line, many kids don't drink any milk at all. That means they completely miss out on essential nutrients they need to think, learn and grow. ASK THE EXPERT

Should I be concerned about high blood pressure in my child?

Absolutely. We are seeing a substantial increase in children with hypertension, or high blood pressure. Here's why you should be concerned: Short-term, hypertension in children reduces their ability to concentrate in school, affecting their test scores. Long-term, high blood pressure puts them at risk for deadly complications such as stroke, heart attack and kidney damage.

This represents an epidemic of a silent killer. We are unknowingly imposing this on our children by allowing them to lead sedentary lifestyles of watching TV and playing video games, and eating a diet high in sodium and fats. It's truly sad to see so many obese children in our midst.

When I started practicing medicine in the early 1990s, about 1 percent of children had persistent hypertension, and these cases were usually associated with chronic disease. Now, 5 to 6 percent of children have hypertension, as do an alarming 20 percent of children who are obese. I see children as young as age 5 to 6 already suffering heart damage and other complications mainly because of high blood pressure.

Why is this happening? Too often, parents let their own unhealthy lifestyles become ingrained in their children, with disastrous results. When we plop ourselves down in front of the tube, throw a frozen pizza in the oven for dinner and drive a few blocks to the store rather than walking, we send a message that this is acceptable behavior. Young children observe and follow our lead. We need to think hard about the examples we are setting.

Fortunately, we can take positive steps to turn this grave situation around. Start by taking your children for walks and encouraging them to run around, ride a bike, play basketball or other activities to get their hearts beating a little faster. Put limits on TV and video game time and explain why you're doing so. Next, rediscover the true delights of fresh fruits and vegetables. Have an orange or banana instead of a candy bar or bag of chips. Drink water instead of soda. Take a few extra minutes to prepare a home-cooked meal instead of the microwave variety, and savor the difference.

These kinds of lifestyle changes may not be easy at first, but they will pay dividends for you - and your children
