Almond-Bancroft School District Participation of Non-Public School Students in District Courses, Programs, and Activities

Policy 424

Participation in Public School Courses and Programs

Non-public school students (private school and home-based private educational program students) may participate in public school courses and programs in the Almond-Bancroft School District as follows:

- 1. A private school student may take up to two high school courses per semester provided the following conditions are met: (a) the student meets the district's high school admission requirements; (b) the student resides in the District; and (c) there is sufficient space in the classroom.
- A home-based private educational program student, whether he/she resides in the District or not, may take up to two courses during a semester at any public school in the District provided the following conditions are met:

 (a) the student has met the standards for admission at that grade level as required by law and as established by the District Administrator or designee;
 (b) there is sufficient space in the classroom; and (c) the student is taking no more than two courses in any public school in the state during any semester.
- 3. A non-public school student who resides in the District may participate in District educational programs or services when specifically required by law. For example, summer school programs and programs for students with disabilities.

Non-public school students attending any course pursuant to this policy are generally subject to the same course requirements, attendance policies, and behavior expectations as are applicable to the District's public school students. Similarly, to the extent permitted by law, non-public school students will be required to meet the same mandatory prerequisites or alternative demonstrations of competency that apply to public school students seeking to take a particular course.

Non-public school students participating in public school courses and programs under this policy shall be responsible for their own transportation to and from the public school, except as otherwise required by law.

Participation in Interscholastic Athletics and Extracurricular Activities

A home-based private educational program student who resides in the District may participate in interscholastic athletics and extracurricular activities in the District on the same basis and to the same extent that students enrolled in the District are allowed to participate. The home-based private educational program in which the student is enrolled shall provide the District with a written statement that the student meets the District's requirements for participation in interscholastic athletics or extracurricular activities based on age and academic and disciplinary records.

DUAL SPORT POLICY ALMOND-BANCROFT HIGH SCHOOL

An athlete may participate in two sports during the same season as an opportunity to experience, learn, and contribute their abilities.

In order to participate:

- 1. The athlete must fill out the dual sport request form and have it signed by a parent or legal guardian.
- 2. Both coaches at the level of participation must approve the dual sport request and sign the form.
- 3. The dual sport request will be reviewed by the athletic director(s) for final approval. The athletic director(s) will look into schedule conflicts between the two sports, the student's grades, the student's physical ability to handle two sports, and the consequences to other players on the affected teams.
- 4. Secure the permission and signatures of the principal and superintendent.
- 5. Student must designate a primary and secondary sport.
- 6. Student must maintain a grade point level equal to or exceeding their current cumulative GPA or they must forego the secondary sport. Grades will be checked at progress report time and quarter time.
- 7. Parents will provide transportation between events that occur on the same day.



The CWES Camp After School Program is back for one more year!

Almond-Bancroft School District and Boys and Girls Club welcome back the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point's Central Wisconsin Environmental Station (CWES), and it's camp-themed after school program for students in 3rd through 6th grade. **NEW** this year, the program is open to new AND former participants (with priority given to new participants). The program will run from mid-October to mid-March, approximately every other Monday. Each session starts at 4:15 in the BGC room and lasts until 5:30. Students do not have to be BGC members to participate in the program.

A grant from the Margaret A. Cargill Foundation is supporting several after-school programs to encourage more students to attend summer camp at CWES. Twenty-five students are sought for the Almond-Bancroft elementary/middle school program taught by CWES staff. Monthly lessons and activities will center on pond study, fishing, stars and stories, survival skills, animals of Wisconsin, camp crafts and campfire songs and skits, with new activities not included in previous years.

Students who take part in the program may apply for partial scholarships for a week of CWES summer camp in 2016. Keep an eye out for more information coming in October.

"My two children have been involved with CWES for the last 2 & 3 years." said Almond-Bancroft parent Richard Levin. "During that time, they have come to understand the environment and our impact upon it so much more than they had before and to work with others in a joint effort. They show tremendous interest in the different activities CWES offers and both have attended CWES parent's night at the camp as well as CWES summer camps where they not only have fun but learned new and interesting things about nature that they can't wait to share when they come home (the letters from [the kids while] camp are Awesome to receive too). This is a great program that I would encourage all parents to involve their children in. It can only return positive results!

Located on the shore of Sunset Lake, CWES hosts an average of 6,000 people each year for college courses, summer camps, school programs, youth and adult programs in leadership, team building and retreats, family reunions and other events. Important Health Reminders!

I'm happy to be returning to Almond-Bancroft for my 5^{th} full year as your school nurse. I will continue to be at school on Tuesday mornings from 8:30 - 12:00 sharing my time between Bancroft and Almond. Returned Health Plans

If your child has a health condition, you should have received information over the summer on how to verify health conditions listed for your child in Skyward Family Access and how to print and return plans to me. If you have not heard from me but were expecting to, please contact me at 715-345-5946. Please return health plans and medication forms as soon as possible as that information is shared with staff working directly with your child.

Medication Orders

The school requests new health plans and medication orders every year as the plans and orders from previous year can not be used. Students that self-carry inhalers need to have a prescription form on file for current school year allowing them to carry their medication. Prescription medication forms and over the counter medication forms can be picked up and turned in at the main office. Medications are not allowed to be transported with you child, they must be hand delivered by a parent or designated adult. Medications must be in their original containers/boxes with prescription label and/or dosing instructions. When filling out over the counter medication forms, please indicate the specific amount of medication your child is to receive not "as directed". We cannot give a dose of over the counter medication that exceeds the box dosing instructions without a physician's order.

Illness

If your child has a fever of >100.0 °, vomits or has diarrhea your child should remain home for 24 hours without symptoms or medication intervention before returning to school. If your child is going to be absent for any reason you need to notify the school by calling 715-366-2941.

Immunizations

Your child is required by law to be compliant with immunization requirements by the 30th day of school (October 13th). To be compliant they either need to have been vaccinated or have a waiver on file for personal, medical (physician signature required) or religious reasons. If you have questions or concerns regarding your child's vaccination status, please call 715-345-5350, press 8 for the operator and request a public health nurse. For those individuals who are uninsured, insurance doesn't cover vaccine or are on medical assistance you are eligible to come to Ruth Gilfry Center (817 Whiting Ave., Stevens Point, WI 54481) for immunizations. Vaccines are \$5 per dose and fee can be waived. We have walk in clinics Tuesdays from 3-6 and Fridays from 9-11.

Congratulations on your successes! The following information will help you plan for your senior portraits and ensure that the photo in your child's yearbook will be treasured. You may submit a photo taken by a professional photographer of your choice, as long as your submitted photo meets deadline, aesthetic and technical specifications. If you have not yet scheduled a sitting with a professional photographer, do so as soon as possible.

The purpose of the senior photo policy is to promote clarity and recognition of students and to discourage controversial submissions.

The photo must be a head and shoulders shot of the student (from the waist up is acceptable). No profiles please (both eyes of the senior should be visible).

The photo should be submitted without any writing on it (the name of the photographer's studio).


- The staff designs the book for portrait pictures only (landscape photos will be cropped).
- The photo must not have an all white or all black background as these photos often look like "cut-outs"
- The photo must not contain props, pets, or persons other than the senior (props include vehicles, sports equipment, instruments, etc.)
- Students in the photo must follow the school dress code. Although it is usually summer when photos are taken, students must have their bodies adequately covered. No cleavage. No hats. No inappropriate logos on t-shirts.

Due to copyright laws, your photographer must submit a senior portrait to the yearbook staff and grant his/her permission for the yearbook staff to publish the photograph. The best way to do this is to have the photographer send an e-mail to Mrs. Rykal which releases the photograph for publication in the Almond-Bancroft Yearbook with the photo attached. <u>Photographers should note that these photos are also used for the senior video at the graduation</u> <u>ceremony and submitted to the Waushara Argus Paper and the Stevens Point Journal</u>.

If you will not be using a professional photographer to take your senior's photo(s), the student may ask a yearbook staff member to take a quality photograph of him/her in a local indoor or outdoor setting. You may also submit an unprofessional photo as long as the picture is well focused and has a high resolution.
