

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
























Mrs. Lehman's and Miss Maves' 5th grade math class have been working on finding the volume of

worked hard, had fun, and even got to enjoy a marshmallow or two while working!




students were tasked with designing and constructing parachutes to safely transport a Peep from an elevated height to the ground as part of a STEM engineering challenge.



The freshman and sophomore students attended the MSTC Showcase, they were able to see and have hands on experiences with some of the programs that MSTC offers.






Ms. Schnelle's Civics and US History classes had a special opportunity to listen to and meet, Olympic bronze-medalist and activist Dr. John Carlos.






