

### November Students of the Month



The ELC (Early Learning Center) opened for the first time this fall. We have a great group of students and staff working to make this program a wonderful addition to the school.




## 4K Registration 2021-2022

The Almond-Bancroft School District will be sending out letters soon to all district families that have a student eligible for Pre-Kindergarten (4K) during the 2021-2022 school year. If you or someone you know has a child who will be 4 before September 1, 2021, they are eligible! However, they will need to have registered their child on the school's census in order to be on the mailing list.

In addition, the School District will also be sending out Preschool Questionnaires to all district children that are between the ages of 30-40 months. The questionnaire that is enclosed will be specific to his/her age range. Families need to have registered their child on the school's census to receive a packet. Not all children of this age are on our census.

### **How do we get added to the census?**

If you, or someone you know, have young children not on the census, please call/have them call Sandy Barden at 715-366-2941 x108 and provide her with the child's name, birthdate, and address. Please note: children can be added to the school census at any age – they do not need to be 30 months!

## Reading Nook

### How to Help Your Reader

Learning to read is complex. Children are learning to do many different things at the same time: trying to read the words and say new words by looking at the parts and sounds, reading at a comfortable pace, understanding the different words, gaining new knowledge, understanding what the book is about, and discovering reading fun! Wow, that is a lot for one young mind-so how do you help your reader?



### FACT

**Vocabulary is word knowledge.** Word learning is an ongoing process-we are always adding to our “word bank.” The goal is to recognize and understand the meaning of spoken and written words.

### TIP

**Encourage your child to ask questions if they do not understand a word.** If your reader hears or reads a word they do not understand they should ask what it means or how to pronounce it. Model this by sharing when you hear a new word or learn a new definition. Even just say, “I never heard that word before.” or ask “What does that word mean? Let’s look it up.”

### GROWTH

Once you have started to identify new words. You can change it up and **make a game of learning new words.** Give your child the assignment to use a new word at school that day and ask them how they used it or listen for a new word and ask them what they learned that day. Words can be a lot of fun to learn! **Your excitement about learning and words will be contagious.**

## Music Notes




COVID-19 has had so many impacts on our programming and music has been hit hard. Singing and the playing of instruments have regulations that aren’t always popular. According to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, the following guidelines are to be followed in schools for choir and for band:

**Choir-** It is recommended students are allowed to sing if wearing a face covering and standing in a straight line with social distancing.

**Band-** It is recommended wind instruments are not played at this time. The face coverings with slits and bell covers are not approved.

Mrs. Nowinski and Ms. Schmidt are both eagerly waiting for the time they can resume normal activity in their music classes. The recommendations are being followed for safety reasons. The guidelines continue to be monitored and addressed in leadership meetings. When the limitations are lifted, we will begin implementing more normal musical activities.
