Mrs. 2nd Grade Class Poems 2022

This type of poem does not contain rhyming words. Haiku is also an unrhymed poetic form that consists of 17 syllables. Typically, every first line of Haiku has 5 syllables, the second line has 7 syllables, and the third has 5 syllables. The haiku gives a moment of insight and is usually based on observation.

Ms. Parr's middle school class picked up trash around the school property during Eagle Time to celebrate Earth Day!





As the weather gets warmer, we start to think about summer vacation. Summer vacation is a great time to get caught up on immunizations your student may need. Per DHS guidelines, all students entering Kindergarten through 5th grade should have received 4 Polio, 3 Hepatitis B, 2 Varicella, 4 DTap, and 2 MMR vaccines. All students entering 6th grade should have received the Tdap vaccine. If you wish to waive any vaccines, please fill out the immunization waiver form. The student immunization record waiver form must be signed by a parent/guardian and each immunization you wish to waiver must be listed. Please list the reason you wish to waive the immunization by checking the correct box on the form. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me at 715 -345-5764.

Media Release - Summer Food Service Program

Stressing the importance of offering nutritious meals to children during the summer months, the Almond-Bancroft School District announces the sponsorship of the Summer Food Service Program.

The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), which is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and is administered by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, provides nutritious meals to children during the summer, when free and reduced-price school meals are typically unavailable. Free meals will be made available to children 18 years of age and under. Persons over 18 years of age who are determined by a state or local public educational agency to be mentally or physically disabled and who also participate in a public or private non-profit school program during the regular school year may receive free meals as well.
