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Notes from the District Administrator

Ahhhh, winter! In Wisconsin people have a much different view of winter than many other states. With our beautiful scenery (that looks even more beautiful snow covered) and our numerous outdoor winter activities, many people love winter in Wisconsin. Personally, I like it but I don't love it. I

do like staying in and reading a book, but I could do without the slippery roads and the freezing temperatures.

As a District Administrator, one of my duties is to determine if and when we will have a late start, snow day or early release because of weather. I want to let you know that I take this responsibility very seriously. I know there is a burden on parents to figure out child care and the multiple decisions that need to be made. I work closely with our bus company and other district administrators in the area to make the decision that will be in the best interest of our children and families.

State law requires that our students are in school for a certain number of hours. Each year we make sure that we plan for additional hours in our school calendar, so that if we need to, we can call off school and have a traditional snow day. However, this year we have had several snow days already. Because of this, we are now going to have 'Virtual Learning Days' if we have to call school off again because of weather.

Parents and guardians should have received an email with information about the format and expectations of these virtual days. Elementary parents will receive a manilla envelope with reading, math, and other academic activities for their students to complete. Middle school and high school students will find their class check-in and assignments on Google Classroom. This is similar to our virtual days in November.

Mid-year iReady tests show learning growth

At Almond-Bancroft we are proud of the connections and relationships that we build with our students. As a small district, we are able to truly get to know our students in many different areas. One aspect of our students that we are focusing on this year is academic performance. In the past our staff mainly focused on classroom level information to assess what students knew and were able to do. We have always participated in mandated state testing and district assessments, but we haven't always utilized the results of these assessments because the data was very broad.

This year the district purchased a new district assessment called iReady for reading and math. This is an assessment that is given three times a year. Through this assessment, we are able to see the learning growth of our students. One of the reasons we changed to iReady was that the student learning data is broken down into different categories, so our teachers have more information that they can use to support students in their classrooms. iReady also has teacher resources and an online personalized student program that gives students the opportunity to work on skills that the assessment shows they are struggling with.

As this is new to the students and the teachers, we are looking at results while considering it is a new assessment and students may not always be motivated to participate.

PreK-12 Principal Message

This year there were some changes to our attendance policy, and as the year passes, some questions have arisen from parents/guardians. I hope this can help make some sense of the changes!

Parents/guardians are able to call-in a student for illness or injury 10 times during the school year **without** having to provide a doctor's excuse. On Skyward, this type of absence will show up as E-IL or E-IN. Once those 10 call-ins are used, students will need a doctor's excuse in order to be excused from school. If a student goes to a doctor due to an illness, they should request a doctor's excuse for the days absent. This excuse should cover the days that led up to the doctor's visit and any days the doctor feels the student should not be in school following the visit. On Skyward, this type of absence will show up as E-DX. Absences coded as E-DX do **not** count toward the 10 call-in illness days.

Parents/guardians are also able to take a child out of school a total of 10 days a year for appointments, vacations, or other planned absences. Vacations are seen in Skyward as P-VA. Appointments are different. It is inevitable that some doctor, dentist, or other medical appointments will need to be scheduled during the school day. On Skyward, this type of absence will show up as P-AP. If the student brings back a slip from the appointment, the absence will be changed to E-DX. If an absence is changed to E-DX, it will no longer count toward the 10 planned absence days, so our attendance officer always asks for a slip. This is just a reminder, meant to help the student have as few P-AP days on record as possible. Slips can be brought in at any time, and the attendance will be updated.

Sometimes parents/guardians will call in and let the school know a student will not be in school, but they do not give a reason for the student being absent. This is coded under personal business. On Skyward it will show up as C-PB. These absences are counted toward the 10 allowed planned absences. Once the attendance record has 10 days of planned absence (whether they are marked P-VA, P-AP, or C-PB), all future planned absences will be unexcused.

Because the days seem to slide one into another, the school sends out notification of the number of absences at particular intervals. These letters are NOT part of the truancy process. They are simply to assist parents/guardians in keeping track of how many absences their child has.




ALMOND-BANCROFT SCIENCE OLYMPIAD



Felicity Budelier and Gracelyn Breitenstein of the Almond-Bancroft High School Science Olympiad team competed in their first in-person meet on Saturday, December 3rd at Boyceville. Felicity placed 2nd in Cell Biology and 5th in Fermi Questions. Gracelyn placed 6th in Anatomy & Physiology.

On January 14th team members Gracelyn Breitenstein, Felicity Budelier, Logan Fuehrer, and Candace Lein competed at the Medford Invitational against 12 teams. Our team competed in 10 events and each team member medaled in at least one event! Felicity and Gracelyn placed 1st in Precision Medicine and 4th in Write it, Do it. Gracelyn and Candace placed 2nd in Anatomy & Physiology. Felicity and Logan placed second in Flight. Felicity and Candace placed 4th in Cell Biology.

On January 21st team members Felicity Budelier and Candace Lein joined 60 other teams from Wisconsin, Minnesota, & North Dakota to compete at UWRF's Border Battle Science Olympiad Tournament. Both Felicity and Candace received 3 medals each and competed in 10 of the 28 Science Olympiad events! Candace placed 1st in Virology, 5th in Green Generation, and 7th in Environmental Chem and Forensics. Felicity placed 1st in Cell Biology, 2nd in Precision Medicine, 6th in Fermi Questions. Together they placed 2nd in Disease Detectives and 3rd in Flight.



What is Science Olympiad? Science Olympiad competitions are like academic track meets, consisting of a series of 28 team events. The events are split over 6 time slots and can be completed with a partner. Each school-based team is allowed to bring 15 students who cross-train for a variety of events in their skill set, but some school clubs have more than 75 members, allowing for an apprentice and mentoring system.

The achievements of the FOUR members of the Almond-Bancroft Science Olympiad team are outstanding! These students are putting in a lot of time and effort outside of their required academic work. Some topics overlap with previously learned material but most are beyond the scope taught in high school. The knowledge, skills, and experience gained will help all team members in their future studies and careers.






SECOND GRADE ECOMOMICS


make any amount of donation toward the cost of the trip please contact me or our district office. The price of the trip is \$675 per student.



Classes will be held in the Almond-Bancroft High School auditorium.

Registration will begin at 7:00 PM SHARP on Tuesday March 7,2023. Students under 18 years of age MUST HAVE a parent or legal guardian with them to register. The cost is \$10 per student. After registration, we will distribute course material. Students will be dismissed at about 9:00 PM. Further info on class dates and what will be taught, will be available at registration. Classes will be held on March 7, 9, 11, 14, 16 and 18, 2023. On weekdays the class will run from 6:30 -9 PM and on Saturdays the class will run from 8AM until noon, maybe longer.

Students will be required to have a DNR customer ID number before graduation from the course. It is best if each student has their customer ID number before class starts. Students can obtain a DNR ID# by calling 1-888-936-7463 from 7AM to 10PM, or they can visit a DNR Service Center during regular scheduled hours.

For pre-registration, log on to the Go Wild Wisconsin and look up the education tab for a list of classes and enter your customer number to reserve your seat, or we can add you after the first class when you register.
