





2023 Almond-Bancroft Additions to the 8-Player Football State Record Book

- Four players (Gibraltar's Braden Kita, Wabno/Laona's Cooper Albrecht, Three Lakes/Phelps' Jared Kaufman, and Almond-Bancroft's T.J. Lamb) all threw seven touchdown passes in a single game, tying them for third in state history.
- Almond-Bancroft's Ayden Phillips caught 73 passes, which is tied for third-most in a single season.
- Almond-Bancroft's Ayden Phillips is up to second in career receptions with 155 and third in career receiving yards with 2,420, as he still has a year for the Eagles. He is also tied for fourth on the career list with 29 touchdowns catches.
- Almond-Bancroft's Shane Klismith set a new state record with four interceptions in one game.

The kindergarten students learned about different states of matter. They enjoyed understanding solids, liquids, and gases with a sweet treat! Root beer floats!







Families need to have registered their child on the school's census to automatically receive 4K programing information.


How do we get added to the census?
