Almond-Bancroft Operational Referendum

You Have the Information – Now It's Time to Vote By Superintendent Rich Hanson

For the last two months, we have been working diligently to provide accurate, understandable information about the operating referendum vote on Tuesday, April 3.

We have had the opportunity to visit with many residents throughout the Almond-Bancroft School District. These conversations have confirmed that all residents - young, old, lifelong and newcomers - value education and understand the important role that it plays in our future.

We hope every voter carefully considers their decision when they go to the voting booth. The results of this vote will significantly determine the path of our school district for the foreseeable future.

Since this is our final opportunity to write to you prior to April 3, I would like to review the major reasons for the referendum.

The \$525,000 annual recurring operational funds sought in the April 3 referendum address four major needs in the Almond-Bancroft School District while calling for no increase in the school tax rate.

Those areas of need are:

Curriculum and instruction.

Technology.

Teacher retainment and recruitment.

Facility and equipment maintenance.

We also need to address rebuilding our Fund Balance that is used to pay expenses while waiting for tax revenue and state and federal aid. It is currently at only about \$673,000 and should be closer to \$1,500,000 for a district our size.

Since we are retiring our 1998 building addition and the 2013 technology referendum at the end of the 2017-18 school year, we can fund the \$525,000 with **no school tax rate increase.**

Be sure to cast your vote next Tuesday, April 3.

Tick Season is Here

It's that time of year again where ticks are out in full force. Deer ticks can transmit Lyme disease which, if not diagnosed and treated properly, can cause serious health problems. If a tick is found moving on a student, at school, it will be removed. If the tick is embedded, parent(s)/guardian(s) will be contacted.

Please remind children about the danger of tick bites and how to handle a tick should one be found on them. Make sure to check for ticks after being outside especially in areas with

tall grasses or wooded areas.

Tips for preventing tick bites are:

- 1. Wear light-colored clothes;
- 2. Tuck pants into boots or socks;
- 3. Wear long sleeved shirts, buttoned at the cuff and collar;
- 4. Wear a hat
- 5. Apply tick/insect repellent to pants, socks, and shoes.



Healthy Chicken Pot Popovers	
Ingredients	
Popovers:	Filling:
Baking spray with flour	3 cups low-sodium chicken broth
1 cup whole milk	1/3 cup all-purpose flour
3/4 cup all-purpose flour	4 tablespoons grated Parmesan
3 large eggs, lightly beaten	Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract	1 cup frozen peas and carrots
Kosher salt	1/2 rotisserie chicken, skin discarded and white and dark meat shredded (about 3 cups)
3 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted	1/4 cup loosely packed flat-leaf parsley, chopped, for garnish
1/4 teaspoon baking powder	

Directions:

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F. Spray a 12-cup muffin tin generously with the baking spray. For the popovers: Whisk the milk, flour, eggs, vanilla and 1/2 teaspoon salt in a medium bowl until combined. Drizzle in the melted butter while whisking until combined; let the batter stand for 5 minutes. Add the baking powder; whisk the batter to combine and divide it evenly among the muffin cups (a scant 1/4 cup batter per muffin cup). Bake the popovers until puffed and browned around the edges, 20 to 25 minutes, rotating the pan about half-way through. For the filling: While the popovers are baking, put the broth and flour into a medium saucepan and whisk until the flour is dissolved. Place the saucepan over medium heat and whisk continuously until the mixture comes to a boil; continue to whisk until the mixture is thick enough to coat the back of a spoon, 4 to 5 minutes. Reduce the heat to low and whisk in 2 tablespoons of the Parmesan, 1 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Stir in the peas and carrots, then the chicken; cover to keep warm. To assemble: When the popovers are done, turn them out of the pan, using a small spatula if necessary. Arrange 2 popovers on each of six plates or bowls and top with the chicken filling, dividing evenly among the popovers. Garnish with chopped parsley and sprinkle on the remaining 2 tablespoons of grated Parmesan.

Bake of 20 minutes. Serves 6.





# Verlyn R. Scheider

# for Contributions Provided to Our District/ Community.

Many of you may never have known Verlyn Scheider, however, those who did knew he loved this small community. Verlyn loved life and very much enjoyed being around others and never hesitated to help when a need arose. Verlyn recently passed away at the age of 90. He was born in the Town of Buena Vista on November 23, 1926. The son of Robert and Dora Scheider, Verlyn was baptized at the St. Paul Lutheran Church, which was at that time located in the Town of Buena Vista. Verlyn attended the Sunnyside Grade School, a one room school house near his childhood home. He went on to attend the Almond High School, now the site of Almond-Bancroft Schools. When Verlyn was 16 years old, tragedy struck the family when his father died. Verlyn took over the family farm for a period of time before taking up work at American Motors in Milwaukee. He then entered into the U.S. Army and served for two years in the Korean War. After his time in the military, Verlyn returned to work at American Motors for 31 years until retiring to his farm in 1980.

Being an active participant in life was important to Verlyn. He was an member of the American Legion Post 339 in Almond; he loved playing the harmonica, played baseball and was manager of the Moore Barn Baseball Team for many years. He also enjoyed riding and breaking horses, traveling the United States, Canada, Mexico, as well as Europe. Verlyn loved playing music; he played the tuba, mouth organ and the accordion. The game of golf was one of Verlyn's loves, continuing to play the game even at the age of 89. He was also considered to be an expert story teller, and for those that knew him, he always had a few to tell!

Verlyn loved this community, and as part of his estate planning, wanted to give back to the community that helped shape his life. He has provided Almond-Bancroft Public Schools with significant funds designated for post-secondary scholarships, Music Department updates, as well as playground equipment additions. Verlyn made other significant donations to the community including: St. John's Lutheran Church, Golden Needles Quilting Club, the Almond Historical Society, the Almond Rod and Gun Club, Almond Fire and EMT Department, the Almond-Bancroft Eagle Booster Club, and the Almond American Legion Post 339. He also was able to support other organizations including: the Children's Miracle Network "Special Needs Fund", St. Joseph's Hospital in Marshfield, the Waupaca Thedacare Hospice, and the Mike Biadasz Farm Safety Memorial Fund in Amherst.

Though Verlyn never had any children of his own, he very much felt the need to help and support the education of our community's youth, as well as give back to the community as a whole. Almond-Bancroft Schools and community very much appreciate his contributions that will impact so many of our children.

#### TO THE VOTERS OF ALMOND-BANCROFT SCHOOL DISTRCIT

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in Almond-Bancroft School District, on April 3, 2018, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, if any, in the sample ballot below.

#### **INFORMATION TO VOTERS**

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

#### Where Paper Ballots are Used

The voter shall make a mark (X) in the square next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall make a mark (X) in the square next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall make a mark (X) in the square next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using a *tactile ballot marking device (Vote-PAD)* to mark a **paper** ballot, the voter shall obtain from the inspectors, the assistive device and any audio or dexterity aids if required. The voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of a person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote, and fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "no" if opposed to the question.

#### Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device ("Automark"*) to mark an **optical scan** ballot, the voter shall touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen at "no" if opposed to the question.

#### Where Touch Screen Voting is Used

The voter shall touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen at "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

If the voter spoils a **paper or optical scan** ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

The voter may spoil a **touch screen** ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

#### After Voting the Ballot

After an official **paper** ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show, but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. The voter shall leave the booth, deposit the ballot in the ballot box, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official **optical scan** ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the voter shall leave the booth, insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official **touch screen** ballot is cast, the voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

**Notice to Voters:** If you are voting on Election Day, your ballot must be initialed by two election inspectors. If you are voting absentee, your ballot must be initialed by the municipal clerk or deputy clerk. Your ballot may not be counted without initials. (See back of ballot for initials.)

#### Instructions to Voters

If you make a mistake on your ballot or have a question, ask an election inspector for help. (Absentee Voters: Contact your municipal clerk.)

To vote for a name on the ballot, make an "X" or other mark in the square next to the name, like this: T To vote for a name that is not on the ballot, write the name on the line marked "write-in."
