
Thank Yous and Dates to Look Forward To


Read Across America 2019

Geography Bee 2019


On Thursday, January 17th, the 4th-8th grade Geography Bee took place. There were three students who qualified from each grade.

CWC All Star Honors Choir


Almond-Bancroft High School Choir students participated in the CWC All Star Honors Choir on Saturday, January 26th.




HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT ARTWORK

The ACT is an exam that every junior in the state takes to ascertain their readiness for post-high school education. Sixty percent of our students who participated in the ACT exam scored in the range which is considered Proficient or Advanced in both math and English. In the entire state there were only a handful of school districts that had a higher percentage of their students who exceeded this 60% threshold of Proficient and Advanced.

We commend the hard work of our scholars that led to this success, as well as the effort of our amazing staff who have created opportunities for our students to grow and succeed throughout their PreK-12 careers. Despite our small size, our educators and scholars have demonstrated that the Almond-Bancroft School District provides young people the same opportunities for success as the largest schools in the state.

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association has a message for parents of high school student-athletes:

Dear Mom and Dad: Cool it.

If you are the mother or father of a high school athlete here in Wisconsin, this message is primarily for you.

When you attend an athletic event that involves your son or daughter, cheer to your heart's content, enjoy the camaraderie that high school sports offer and have fun. But when it comes to verbally criticizing game officials or coaches, cool it.

Make no mistake about it. Your passion is admired, and your support of the hometown team is needed. But so is your self-control. Yelling, screaming and berating the officials humiliates your child, annoys those sitting around you, embarrasses your child's school and is the primary reason Wisconsin has an alarming shortage of high school officials.

It's true. According to a recent survey by the National Association of Sports Officials, more than 75 percent of all high school officials say "adult behavior" is the primary reason they quit. And 80 percent of all young officials hang up their stripes after just two years of whistle blowing. Why? They don't need your abuse.

Plus, there's a ripple effect. There are more officials over 60 than under 30 in many areas. And as older, experienced officials retire, there aren't enough younger ones to replace them. If there are no officials, there are no games. The shortage of licensed high school officials is severe enough in some areas that athletic events are being postponed or canceled—especially at the freshman and junior varsity levels.

Research confirms that participation in high school sports and activities instills a sense of pride in school and community, teaches lifelong lessons like the value of teamwork and self-discipline and facilitates the physical and emotional development of those who participate. So, if the games go away because there aren't enough men and women to officiate them, the loss will be infinitely greater than just an "L" on the scoreboard. It will be putting a dent in your community's future.

If you would like to be a part of the solution to the shortage of high school officials, you can sign up to become a licensed official at HighSchoolOfficials.com. Otherwise, adult role models at high school athletic events here in Wisconsin are always welcome.

4K Registration 2019-2020

The Almond-Bancroft School District will be sending out letters soon to all district families that have a student eligible for Pre-Kindergarten (4K) during the 2019-2020 school year. If you or someone you know has a child who will be 4 before September 1, 2019, they are eligible! However, they will need to have registered their child on the school's census in order to be on the mailing list.

In addition, the School District will also be sending out Preschool Questionnaires to all district children that are between the ages of 30-40 months. The questionnaire that is enclosed will be specific to his/her age range. Families need to have registered their child on the school's census to receive a packet. Not all children of this age are on our census.

How do we get added to the census?

If you, or someone you know, have young children not on the census, please call/have them call Sandy Barden at 715-366-2941 x108 and provide her with the child's name, birthdate, and address. Please note: children can be added to the school census at any age – they do not need to be 30 months!
