Senior Class Trip

Family secrets, epic escapes, a Nazi submarine, rude waiters, and a dinner cruise were just some of the educational, and exciting, adventures had by the senior class in the Windy City. The story begins at the Embassy Suites in downtown Chicago where students enjoyed time in the pool.

On Friday, they saw Chicago from The Skydeck of the Willis Tower. The brave Almond-Bancroft Eagles stood out on The Ledge - a clear box at 1,353 feet above the ground. Next they had a feast at The Italian Village and walked off a few calories down by The Bean and Buckingham Fountain. The Shedd Aquarium offered a view into a world underwater. Rounding out the day was a dinner and dance cruise where quite a few students showed off their moves.

Saturday began with a tour of the Chicago mob scene, led by Frank Calabrese, a former member of the mob. He provided a history of organized crime in Chicago and shared his experience of being in, and getting out of, the family business. Students then went to The Museum of Science and Industry. There they saw tornadoes, flew a fighter plane, toured a Nazi U-boat, and witnessed many unique scientific wonders. Our time at the museum ended with a movie in the Omnimax Theater. After the museum, the group went to Water Tower Place to do a bit of shopping. Then it was time for dinner at Dick's Last Resort where the waiters are rude, but the food was delicious! All in good fun! The final activity of the day was the Haunted Chicago Tour, which described historic tragedies, and haunts, around the city.

Sunday was the last day of the trip, which began with a friendly competition of escape adventures. Whether it was a gold rush, a prison break, a stolen work of art, a mission to Mars, or special ops, the missions were the same; solve the puzzles, find the clues, and get out within one hour. We are happy to report that all of the groups made it out in time - some faster than others, but who's counting? A stop at Dylan's Candy Bar and lunch at Portillo's (a favorite Chicago hot dog and sandwich restaurant) concluded the trip. The ride home was quiet, except for the occasional snore...



If changes were made to your schedule, please keep in mind that schedule changes without a student request only occurs when there are conflicts, if courses are full, or if a student has failed a pre-requisite. If a course is full, priority goes to upperclassmen (Seniors) trying to meet graduation requirements and to students that have a full year or continuing class.



We learned that rules were very strict in the Hie Corner Schoolhouse, which was donated by Mrs. Blanke's family. We also visited the Circus House, home to 2 of the 116 circuses that began in Wisconsin and the first in the area to have electricity, and the Franklin/Calkins house, which was home to a wealthy potato farmer. In the barn, we saw tools, machines, and even a buggy! The buildings had many artifacts to see; the first refrigerator, two of the oldest pianos in Portage County, a cranberry sorter, as well as many objects for daily use. SENIOR PORTRAITS FOR THE YEARBOOK

Senior Photo Submission Deadline: Friday, December 6th 2019

Congratulations on your successes! The following information will help you plan for your senior portraits and ensure that the photo in your child's yearbook will be treasured. You may submit a photo taken by a professional photographer of your choice, as long as your submitted photo meets deadline, aesthetic and technical specifications. It isn't too soon to schedule your senior portrait sitting with your favorite photographer.

The purpose of the senior photo policy is to promote clarity and recognition of students and to discourage controversial submissions.

The photo must be a head and shoulders shot of the student (from the waist up is acceptable). No profiles please (both eyes of the senior should be visible).

The photo should be submitted without any writing on it (the name of the photographer's studio, etc.).

The staff designs the book for portrait pictures only (landscape photos will be cropped).

The photo must not have an all-white or all-black background, as these photos often look like "cutouts"

The photo must not contain props, pets, or persons other than the senior (props include vehicles, sports equipment, instruments, etc.). Pictures taken inn a natural environment look best.

Students in the photo must follow the school dress code. Although it is usually Summer when photos are taken, students must have their bodies adequately covered. No cleavage. No hats. No inappropriate logos on t-shirts.

Due to copyright laws, your photographer must submit a senior portrait to the yearbook staff and grant his/her permission for the yearbook staff to publish the photograph. The best way to do this is to have the photographer send an e-mail to Mrs. Rykal which releases the photograph for publication in the Almond -Bancroft Yearbook with the photo attached. <u>Photographers should note that these photos are also used for the senior video at the graduation ceremony and submitted to the Waushara Argus Paper and the Stevens Point Journal.</u>

If you will not be using a professional photographer to take your senior's photo, the student may ask Mrs. Rykal to take a quality photograph of him/her in a local indoor or outdoor setting. You may also submit an unprofessional photo as long as the picture is well focused and has a high resolution. If no picture is submitted, the school photo will be utilized.

Do You Love Children and Enjoy Helping in a School Setting?

The Portage County Foster Grandparent Program has openings for older adults to join the Foster Grandparent Program. Foster Grandparent volunteers are needed to help in local schools and Head Start sites for the 2019-2020 school year. Training to start during the summer.

The Foster Grandparent Program is ideal for people who enjoy children, have some extra time, want activity to keep young, and could use a tax-free stipend each month. Under the supervision of a teacher, each Foster Grandparent spends 7.5-20 hours per week assisting children, one-on-one and in small groups, who need extra help in areas such as school readiness, reading, social skills or mentoring. On-going training is provided and no previous teaching experience is needed.

Candidates for the program must be in reasonably good health, be age 55 or older and meet income eligibility requirements (\$2082/month for a one person household or \$2,818/month for a two person household. Individuals with somewhat higher incomes may still qualify if they have higher medical expenses.). The stipend a Foster Grandparent receives does not impact any other aid or benefits they might already be receiving, such as subsidized housing or medical assistance. They also receive travel assistance, meals at the school, and many other benefits.


