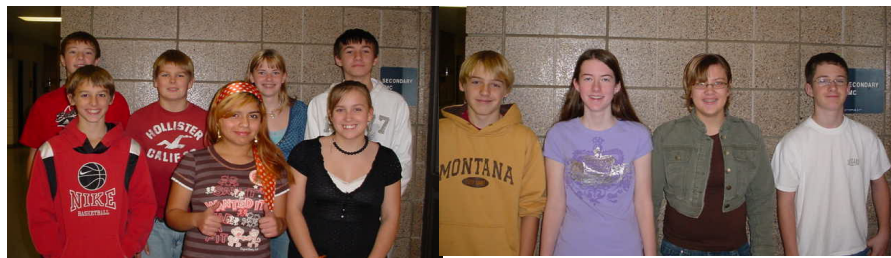

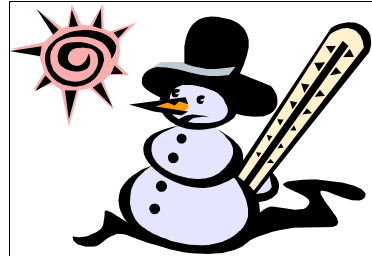

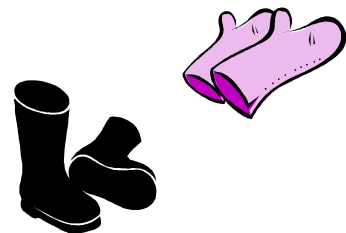

## FROM THE LIBRARY

### **A-B School to Receive \$12,457.33 in E-Rate Funds**

Each year public schools across the country apply for E-Rate funds. The E-Rate (The Schools and Libraries Universal Service Support Mechanism) provides discounts to assist public schools in their quest to obtain affordable Telecommunications and Internet Access. The Universal Service Program is administered by the Schools and Libraries Division (SLD) of the Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC). This corporation was appointed by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to ensure that the benefits of telecommunications services reach as many students and communities as possible - especially small and rural schools such as ours. To be eligible, each school must have a Technology Plan in place and meet the requirements of the Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA) as directed by the FCC. Then the school must appoint a person to fill out a series of complex online forms and federal paperwork in order to apply for reimbursements and discounts on behalf of the school. This person may be the Computer/Technology Coordinator, the District Administrator, the Elementary or Secondary Principal, or in my case, the LMC Director. I am pleased to announce that the Almond-Bancroft School District will receive \$12,457.33 in discounts and reimbursements for Telecommunication and Internet bills for the time frame of 7-01-2007 through 6-30-2008.

*The district's pupil count is 506. The count was improved this year by the addition of 4-year-old kindergarten.*

Legislative updates

*Nothing has changed since last meeting.*

Budget Updates

*Currently we are being directed by the state to use last year's numbers for our revenue limit. Using last year's number means that the district would receive more money than what was proposed at the annual meeting.*

SAGE

*The proposed budget included \$140,000 for SAGE revenue. We now have better numbers and the total is \$146,000. The Governor has recommended changing the per pupil amount from \$2,000 to \$2,250. If the \$2,250 recommended number is passed into law this would create an additional \$24,250 for the school.*

Food Service

*The food service department has had record numbers this year. Breakfast was served to 148 students and staff. Lunch was served to 403 students, staff, and visitors.*

8B PK-12 Principal Report

Report on school activities

*There is one more piece of equipment that needs to be put together for the Bancroft playground. The bolts that were sent along with the equipment were too short. One of Bill Wagner's classes*



*will be putting the equipment together when we get the correct bolts. 4 year-old Kindergarten is going very well. The fire department was at Bancroft elementary to teach the students about fire safety. The elementary classes participated in a "Pinwheels for Peace" program. They put 50 of the pinwheels in the ground around our sign. BABES was introduced to the students. BABES is part of the AODA program for young students. Monday Gilbert Brown spoke to grades 1 to 5 and the Middle School and High School football teams. Thanks goes to Kim Weiss's brother for setting up the assembly. At the secondary level Homecoming went well. The pep rally was a lot of fun. The band did well. Thanks go out to Lynne Dernbach, the Student Counsel, and teachers who judged the various competitions.*

*Positive Action training for Class Action will start next week. There will also be trainings in December and January. Bob Rohde attended the Middle School math grant meeting. Reach Grant Leadership team in-service is 11-7-07 for half a day. Shane Dornfeld is leading the Middle School Alternative Ed grant-tutoring program and he is tutoring 8 to 15 students a night.*

*The concrete will be poured by the tech ed class this fall and the shed at the football field will be built by the tech ed class. Thank you to Pop Warner for donating a brand new paint sprayer to paint the football field. PIE open house went very well and will not be changing the menu for next year. Forty swimmers participated in the swim program. \$125 was donated by the Girl Scouts. PIE is looking to try to bring an assembly to the school involving a cultural fest day. January 21<sup>st</sup>, 2008 is their next meeting.*

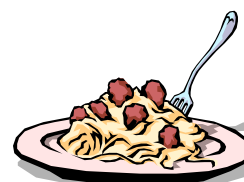

## HEALTHY RECIPES

### Pudding Pumpkin Pie

(Prep: 15 minutes + chilling)

- 1 egg white, beaten
- 1 reduced-fat graham cracker crust (8 inches)
- 1 cup cold fat-free milk
- 1 package (1-1/2 ounce) sugar free instant vanilla pudding mix
- 1 can (15 ounces) solid-pack pumpkin
- 1 tsp. pumpkin pie spice
- ½ tsp ground cinnamon
- ½ tsp ground nutmeg
- 1-1/2 cups reduced-fat whipped topping, divided

Brush egg white over crust. Bake at 375 degrees for 5 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool on wire rack.

In a large bowl, whisk milk and pudding mix. Stir in pumpkin, pumpkin pie spice, cinnamon and nutmeg.

Fold in 1 cup whipped topping. Pour into crust. Refrigerate for 4 hours or overnight.

Cut into slices; dollop with remaining whipped topping. Refrigerate leftovers.



## Skyward Family Access Update

Almond-Bancroft School's implementation of Skyward's Family Access is accessible by clicking the "Family/Student Access" link near the upper left corner of the school's web page at [www.abschools.k12.wi.us](http://www.abschools.k12.wi.us).

Those of you with a Family Access Login ID and Password from last school year are still able to use that same Login ID and Password for your access (I have not implemented a mandatory change of either of these items).

If you completed one or more Family Access forms at the beginning of the school year and have a working Family Access Login ID and Password, I apologize for any miscommunication. You did not need to complete the Family Access form if you have a working Login ID and Password. Only **one initial form is needed per family** for gaining access to all of the family's students.

Just as it did last school year, your Family Access Login ID and Password will allow you access to information regarding each student you have enrolled in the District by using the drop menu near the top center of the screen to select your respective student(s).

In order for you to begin using this service, you will need to obtain a login and password. You may also use the "Almond-Bancroft School District" hyperlink on the Family Access Login screen to email a request for your password; however, please include your phone number and the best time to call for authorization purposes.

Each user's login and password is generated by the Skyward software; however, a Parent/Guardian login and/or Password may be changed at anytime by utilizing the "Account Information" button located in the upper right corner of the Family Access screen, once you have successfully logged in. **Please be certain to enter your email address in the Family Access system so you can use the "Forgot your login or password" hyperlink to retrieve your Login and/or Password when necessary.** I apologize to those of you with uniontel.net email accounts that were unable to retrieve your login and password. Union Telephone's PostIni Anti-Spam service did not like the way the emails were being sent. The emails were successfully sent from the school, but never delivered to your uniontel.net email account. The problem has been fixed, so you can now successfully use the hyperlink to retrieve your information.
