Following Our Adventures to and from Poland

The Polish heritage has a prominent and valuable place in our community, which inspired our desire to strengthen its emphasis within our elementary curriculum.

This inclusion will help to reinforce student global awareness by personally connecting with family traditions and community ancestry. The Polish heritage is the second most prominent ancestry of our rural town and the number one ancestry of our county. Our surrounding community is the first Polish rural settlement in Wisconsin and the second in the United States, many of the Polish immigrants originated from the Poznan region of Poland. These demographics, which were gathered from the area Polish Heritage Awareness Society, helped motivate our rationale for this fellowship.

During the dates of July 18th through July 28th we will be traveling to Poland due to our grant award from Fund for Teachers.

Here are the details of our upcoming trip.

-On the 19th we'll be arriving in Poland's capital, Warsaw.

-On the 20th we will be traveling near Krakow to tour Auschwitz, a Holocaust concentration camp. Though the events of the Holocaust do not define the people of Poland, it has played an important role of who they are.

- On the 21st we will be discovering and exploring the city through the Warsaw City Tour. This tour will include places such as: The Old Town, the Royal Palace on the Water, and the Houses of Parliament. Through visiting these sites we will begin to assemble a portfolio of artifacts such as, candid pictures, architecture, and sights, video journals with native comments, as well our reflections, brochures, and demonstration videos.

-On the 22nd we will explore two locations that represent important aspects of Polish history. We will begin by visiting Treblinka, a Nazi extermination camp, where we will develop an understanding of the somber reality that occurred at this site. We will share the feelings and knowledge we gain with the 5th grade class, as guest speakers and resources, during their unit on the Holocaust. From there we will travel to Tykocin, a small town with the shtetl spirit (meaning a little town with a large Jewish population), near the Narew River. In contrast to Treblinka, Tykocin will give us a glimpse of what peacetime Poland looked like before the Holocaust.

-On the 23rd a guide will take us on tour encompassing a mix of experiences in the Southeast part of Warsaw. To develop a sense of a rural community's history with a strong focus on art, we will visit Kazimierz Dolny. Here we will collect a broader spectrum of architectural designs to be used as a representation of native designs within the elementary Art curriculum, Polish Information Station, and Polish Festival. Next, we will travel to Lublin where we will visit the State Museum at Majdanek.

-On the 24th-27th we will travel to the rural community of Gulcz, which is the sister-city of Stevens Point. There we will stay with a local Polish family, visit school personnel, government officials, and local business leaders. This will give us the opportunity to compare our community to a traditional Polish community and be submersed in the Polish culture.

-On the 28th we will be flying back to the United States!

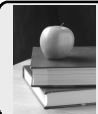

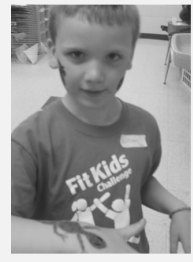
Cultural Food Fun!

Energy Demonstration



Dylan Warzynski, a 2010 AB graduate took time out of his college schedule to bring the Chippewa Valley Technical College Energy Demonstration Lab to Almond-Bancroft. Dylan demonstrated how switch canola, soybean, and sunflower seeds are pressed and turned into biodiesel.

The CVTC Agriscience Technology department plants and harvests 25 acres of sustainable alternative energy crops to be used to produce alternative energy. One acre of sunflowers or canola can produce 100-130 gallons of oil to be used in biodiesel. Biodiesel is a domestic, renewable fuel for diesel engines derived from natural oils. The byproducts are also used for feed.

Thank you Dylan for showing the AB FFA/Agriculture, Chemistry, and Math students the process from start to finish. A few local farmers and community members were also able to see the process while the lab was at school.

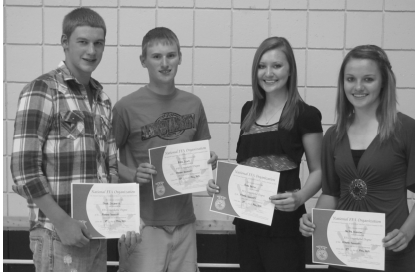
