Notes from the District Administrator

Spring is approaching and learning is in full swing here at A-B Schools. As you may know, this is a time of year that can be challenging. Keep these ideas in mind:

- Make attendance your number one priority. Let your child(ren) know attendance is important even if it is virtual.

January Students of the Month--


Callie Warzynski was our 6th grade January student of the month. Callie is a super helper and is very responsible.

QUIZ BOWL Almond-Bancroft's Trivia Masters

Trivia is more than just a game show. Quiz Bowl is a team trivia competition that High School students go head to head with other teams in Central Wisconsin for the title of Champion.

Wednesday. 11 AM. The lunch bell rings and most students hit the lunch line or head to their spot to chow down. For Quiz Bowl members, a collection of Almond's best and brightest, they instead set up buzzers, grab some paper and pencils, and set up two rows of 4 desks. With buzzers in hand, the students get ready to answer questions from identifying chemical molecules to filling in the blank of Shakespeare quotes. There are current events and not-so-current events, with a bit of math tossed in the mix. The students are practicing for the day they have to go head to head against Tri-County, Iola-Scandinavia, and Amherst.

Quiz Bowl has been a regular facet of the high school experience for decades at A-B. It involves 2 teams (A team and B team) of students from high school. The teams play against each other in practice, but in our matches against rival schools, they have 20 minutes to answer as many questions as possible. Each question earns the team points. At the end of the match, the team with the most points wins. The season starts after winter break and goes until early March where the two best A-Teams in the league meet for the championship match.

Students find Quiz Bowl as an exciting challenge as they go head to head in one of the only academic competitions available in the district at the high school level. The captain of the A-Team is Matt Selenske an A-B senior and the captain of the B-Team is Felicity Budelier an A-B sophomore. They both have shown their prowess at Quiz Bowl by showcasing their innate intelligence and leadership. "I enjoy Quiz Bowl," Ms. Budelier says, "because it allows me to show my knowledge of subjects that I would have little opportunity to show anywhere else, and that is why I am part of it." Felicity has led the B-Team in questions answered this year and is anticipating her role as a future A-Team member and potential captain. Both Matt and Felicity have let their teams to successful victories in the 2021 Season. Both teams are 4th in the Southern Division of the Central Wisconsin Conference, with records of 3 wins-2 losses as of Mid-February. Our Bat Conservation Project By Elizabeth and Emily Girl Scouts with Troop 6149



Did you know there are many different types of bats? There are 8 species found in Wisconsin alone. In our community, we have the Little Brown Bat and the Big Brown Bat. In recent years, Wisconsin's bat population has declined significantly, mostly due to White Nosed Syndrome. This disease spreads during the winter while the bats are hibernating. In Wisconsin, most of the species are threatened or are a "species of concern", not yet threatened but close. However, there are a couple of bat species already on the federally endangered list. Why should anyone care about bats? Bats help to pollinate certain fruit and vegetable plants. Did you know that without bats, we would have to say goodbye to bananas, avocados, mangos, and more? Most of the bats that live in Portage and Waushara counties live in trees and bat houses during the summer. They will migrate to the southern counties of Wisconsin or locate somewhere underground to hibernate.

Did you know that bat houses are really nurseries for bat babies (pups)? Having bat houses on your property helps to increase their population in our community. Bat houses give females a safe, warm place to raise their young. Since most female bats only have one pup each year, bat populations grow very slowly. While bats can be pests if they begin living in your house, they actually are very good for the environment. One bat can eat between 1,000 to 4,000 bugs in a night! A nursing mother eats the most, so she could possibly eat more than 4,000 in a single night. Little Brown Bats like to huddle together in the bat house to keep warm and this helps the pups mature faster and fly sooner. Some bat houses can hold over 100 bats depending on their size. The Big Brown Bats live in smaller groups and because of the White Nosed Syndrome, each bat house usually houses between 10-60. There is a steady decline and the DNR is very concerned.

What did we do to help the bat population in our community? For our Bronze Award, we built 2 bat houses each for the Almond Bancroft and Tri-County School Forests to help increase the bat population in our area. We also built 16 houses to be given away to families in our community who would like to help the bat population.

What can you do to help the bat population? You can build a bat house for your property or you can contact us if you would like one of our free bat houses. Installing a bat house on your property can provide a safe environment for bats, while protecting your yard from pest insects, like mosquitoes, moths, and beetles. Then, once you have bats, you can go to the Wisconsin Bat Monitoring Website to begin helping to monitor the bats located on your property. <u>http://wiatri.net/inventory/bats</u>

Healthy Smiles

Dear Healthy Smiles Program Partner,

It has been brought to our attention that a dental program that is not associated with Wisconsin's Seal a Smile program has been outreaching school districts in Portage County regarding their services and being "similar" to Portage County Healthy Smiles. We understand that meeting the needs of your students is important and that the Covid-19 pandemic has provided a lapse in services for the Portage County Healthy Smiles Program. We wanted to bring to your awareness that these programs are not the same, outlining the differences below.

- Healthy Smiles requires that all children enrolled at a school can/should be offered the program at no cost to child or family.
- Other dental programs may charge fees for service for families without dental insurance or those with private insurance, with *each service being a separate fee*, which can add up quickly. *Waivers may be offered, but families may not make the ask and opt out of screening, which in turn could lead to urgent needs not being identified.

More than 60% of Portage County Healthy Smiles participants have private insurance or no insurance.

We are anticipating the return of our Portage County Healthy Smiles program services to our area school districts in the fall of 2021. If you are considering making a switch in program services, I would welcome the opportunity to discuss your concerns and considerations in making this change. We couldn't have a successful program without your partnership, so thank you for helping to make Healthy Smiles Portage County the success it has been in serving our student's needs.

Kindergarten Immunization Requirements and Check-up Recommendations April 2021

Preparing to send your child to school can be both exciting and stressful. Immunizations are a necessary and important part of getting ready for school. You can help your child's transition to kindergarten by having immunizations updated before the school year begins.

State law <u>requires</u> the following immunizations before entering kindergarten:

- **DTP/DTaP:** 5 doses completed by kindergarten entrance are recommended. However a child who has received a 3rd dose or subsequent doses after the 4th birthday meets the requirements.
- **Polio:** 4 doses given at any age are recommended. If your child received the 3rd dose of polio after the 4th birthday further doses are not required.
- Hepatitis B: 3 doses
- MMR: 2 doses The first dose must have been on or after the first birthday.
- Varicella (chickenpox vaccine): 2 doses or a history of having the chicken pox disease.

Every child must be compliant by 30th day of school. Compliant means caught up on immunizations or waiver on file.

- DTP/DtaP (5 doses recommended, if child has received 3rd dose or subsequent dose after 4th birthday meets requirements), Polio (4 doses given at any age recommended, if child received 3rd dose after 4th birthday further doses not required), Hepatitis B (3 doses), MMR (2 doses), and Varicella (chicken pox vaccine, 2 doses or history of disease)
- Immunizations may be waived list vaccines you choose to waive, sign and check box whether for health reasons, religious beliefs, or personal conviction. If check health reason must have Doctor's signature

State law requires schools to have written documentation of each student's immunizations or parental waivers. To document:

- **Immunizations:** If you are new to the district, please obtain a copy of your child's immunization records from your doctor's immunization registry record.
- **Waivers:** Signatures are required when immunizations are waived. Please complete the enclosed waiver form if you choose to have immunization waived.

A copy of your child's immunization record must be on file. If your child receives additional immunizations please call the school secretary so your child's immunization record can be updated.

If your child has a known health condition or a new health condition, be sure to include that information on school registration forms. The school nurse will review this information and may contact you as needed.

During Child Development Days, Portage County Public Health Staff offer vision and hearing screenings. But, if you think your child has a hearing or vision problem now, please don't wait; take your child to see a physician or an eye specialist for a more thorough exam.

Notice of Spring Election and Sample Ballots April 6, 2021

OFFICE OF THE ALMOND-BANCROFT SCHOOL DISTRICT CLERK

TO THE VOTERS OF ALMOND-BANCROFT PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in Almond-Bancroft School District, on April 6, 2021, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, if any, in the sample ballot below.

Information to Voters

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where Paper Ballots are Used

The voter shall make a mark (X) in the square next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall make a mark (X) in the square next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall make a mark (X) in the square next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using a *tactile ballot marking device (Vote-PAD)* to mark a **paper** ballot, the voter shall obtain from the inspectors, the assistive device and any audio or dexterity aids if required. The voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of a person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the question.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device ("Automark," "ExpressVote," Clear Access or "ImageCast Evolution-ICE")* to mark an **optical scan** ballot, the voter shall touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen at "no" if opposed to the question.

Where Touch Screen Voting is Used

The voter shall touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen at "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

Spoiled Ballot

If the voter spoils a **paper or optical scan** ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

The voter may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official **paper** ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show, but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. The voter shall leave the booth, deposit the ballot in the ballot box, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official **optical scan** ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the voter shall leave the booth, insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official touch screen ballot is cast, the voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

The following is a sample of the official ballot:

Official Ballot Almond-Bancroft Public Schools Nonpartisan Office April 6, 2021

Notice to Voters: If you are voting on Election Day, your ballot must be initialed by two election inspectors. If you are voting absentee, your ballot must be initialed by the municipal clerk or deputy clerk. Your ballot may not be counted without initials. (See back of ballot for initials.)

Instructions to Voters

If you make a mistake on your ballot or have a question, ask an election inspector for help. (Absentee Voters: Contact your municipal clerk.)

To vote for a name on the ballot, make an "X" or other mark in the square next to the name, like this: To vote for a name that is not on the ballot, write the name on the line marked "write-in."
