Notes from the District Administrator

First, let me say I hope you and your family are safe and healthy as you read this newsletter. Thank you so much for your patience and understanding as we adjusted, like you, to all the changes the last few months. I am appreciative of our students, parents, teachers and all of our staff members for staying positive and being flexible through trying times.

Our school building and grounds were closed, but school was open with instruction and learning in full motion at a distance. Through online learning and learning packets, our goal was to provide continuous educational opportunities and practice for students in a manner to minimize stress. While we took responsibility to continue to educate our students, we also wanted to compassionately take into consideration the various difficulties and challenges families and staff members faced through the unexpected pandemic.

We still have uncertainty before us as we are not sure what measures will need to be in place for reopening school in the fall. We are being informed to prepare for differing scenarios including having all students back in the building, having 50% of our student population at a time with alternating schedules, or being back in full learning from a distance mode. It will also be important for everyone to be prepared to move through these scenarios with little notice as the school year progresses. Please continue to check our district website for updated information.

In closing, one of our focus points for our staff members and students during the 2019-20 school year was awareness of having a "growth mindset." A growth mindset unlocks our abilities to learn and grow during challenging times. Little did we know how much this would be tested for all of us! Since we gained knowledge and skills developing a growth mindset, we will all be stronger when we come out on the other side of this pandemic. History is being written and we hold the pen. Together, we will write the best story for our children!

Your last year in high school to experience victories in sporting events, your last high school prom, competitions in music, time spent with classmates, a May graduation ceremony and everything else a senior year has to offer before you venture into the next chapter in your lives. Greetings families!

We did it! We made it through the crazy last three months. I'm so proud of our students and their dedication to their studies. I'm proud of the staff and how they were able to adjust their teaching to this highly unusual situation we found ourselves in. I'm most proud of the parent and community support that I've witnessed these past months. It's always

amazing to me how strong and resilient our small communities are when faced with adversity.

It's important for me to recognize how difficult this time period has been for our students. It's strange how often we take things for granted until they are gone. Our students were accustomed to having access to many layers of academic and social emotional support. When COVID-19 hit, the support rug was pulled out from under them. Our administrative team understands this and took this into account when determining how we were going to do the final assessments for our students.

• Middle and High School students will notice on their grade reports that the 4th quarter grades may not be the same as those in the Skyward gradebook. The administrative team decided that students would not earn grades lower than their third quarter grade, but may earn higher if they have put in the time and effort during this closure period.

• Our elementary report cards are more based on standards covered, so parents will notice portions of the report card that do not have any ratings listed. This is due to our inability to make a true assessment of the students skills or, possibly due to time constraints, we were unable to cover that standard/skill. Please note that the staff will work hard next year to do our best to fill any gaps in the students' learning.

Please know the District will continue to communicate with the students, parents, and community as we prepare to enter our new school year in the fall. As plans are made and new information is received, we will continue to update all stakeholders in a timely manner. Please watch our District website for the most recent updates.

Class of 2020 Salutatorian










We are proud of all of our A-B graduating seniors!

Exciting Changes for the Almond-Bancroft 4K Program

Children who are 4 years old before September 1st of each school year, are eligible to attend the 4K (sometimes called Pre-Kindergarten or Pre-K)



Program. The 2020-2021 School Year will bring an exciting change to Almond-Bancroft's Program!

Students attending the 4K program will now attend 4 half-days each week, with an available option for the students to remain in the school building for the entire day; thus being at school 4 FULL DAYS each week. The Extended Learning Center (ELC) will be available for 4K students to receive quality care during the regular school days/hours. There is no cost to families who take advantage of this option and the classroom will be right next door to the 4K Classroom. Here are examples of the tentative schedule for students attending the morning or afternoon 4K Programming sessions:
